September 2019 Study Questions

September 1 – Judges 9:1-19

What sort of campaign slogan can you come up with for Abimelech?

What power do governments depend upon in order to legitimize their authority?

To what does Jotham liken Abimelech?

What is the root of his question to the men of Shechem?

What simple biblical precept is the source of Jotham's judgment?

Commentary: "Might makes right." This is the self-justifying slogan of nearly every campaign for power in the history of man. Whoever has the most power has the right to do as they please. Abimelech saw a problem. Seventy leaders become an unwieldy way to govern. He offered himself as the solution with the built-in advantage that he was part of their own family. Once he had their approval, he simply legitimized his power by killing off the competition. Having the power gave him the right to murder his competition. While our own contemporary governing is a far more civil affair the basic assumption is that the power to rule is the means to effecting what is right. At least in our own eyes.

September 8 – Judges 9:30-57

What injustice was the cause of the ill will felt by the people of Shechem toward Abimelech?

What inspired Gaal and his brothers?

Who is Zebul and what role does he play?

What spiritual dynamics are at work in the events described in this passage?

What is the end result of these dynamics?

Commentary: We may wonder what is so important about this passage. There seems to be little of spiritual import nor much made of God's activity in these events. Yet it does give us another glimpse of man's nature without God. Left to their own devices men seek

revenge, lust for power, thirst for violence, and even more wickedness is on full display. All these are contrary to God. The ultimate result is the wages of sin, with death being the final result. Once more we are shown our need for a savior.

September 15 – Judges 10:1-18

What draws you away from the Lord?

What is the dual pronged nature of sin, which Israel confesses itself as being guilty?

How does God get Israel's attention?

Are you content with God's judgment and punishment in your life?

What battle awaits you that requires your faith and trust in the Lord?

Commentary: Faith must be fought for with great vigilance. Israel's cycle of forsaking the Lord, enduring the loss of blessing, the consequences of enslaving sin, and repentance of sin are not without their parallels in our own lives. The more we fight for the faith that frees us to serve our Lord Jesus Christ, the quicker we become in recognizing the subtle and deceitful nature of sin. Our confidence in winning such battles lies completely in our faith in the One who has already conquered death, hell, and the grave.

September 22 - Judges 11:1-22

How do the circumstances of your birth influence how others regard you?

What brief description do we have of Jephthah's character?

What do Jephthah and Jesus have in common?

Why were vain or worthless men attracted to Jephthah?

Why were the elders of Gilead attracted to him?

How do you evaluate his character?

Commentary: Valor is a word often associated with courage in the face of danger, especially in battle. Although Jephthah had been rejected by his family and forced to flee his home, his exploits as a leader of men caught the attention of the elders in Gilead. Perhaps he was more than a raider (bandit) but someone whose skills were developed through winning small skirmishes with the enemies of Gilead exciting hope in his former kinsmen. Furthermore,

he shows a knowledge of God's dealings with Israel and uses that knowledge to refute the claims of the king of Ammon. It becomes very easy to misjudge someone on the basis of things they have no control over and perceive them as a threat to our own wellbeing.

September 29 – Judges 11:23-40

On what level does Jephthah reason with the king of Ammon?

How do you describe, "the Spirit of the Lord came upon Jephthah?"

Was Jephthah's vow and indication of the strength or weakness of his faith?

What did he expect to come out his door?

What is the difference between what he meant to give and what he had to give to fulfill his vow?

How was Jephthah's vow fulfilled?

Commentary: That the Spirit of the Lord came upon Jephthah tells us the most about what kind of man Jephthah had become. Yet, we also see that no matter how deeply moved we are by God's Spirit, God does not always save us from ourselves. When we try to impress God with our holiness, He is more likely to show us how needy we are. It should also remind us that no matter how much we may be impressed with someone else's godliness we should not be surprised that they still have feet of clay.

Men and women who resist the truth and want the Word to mean something different from that which the Spirit delivered unto us through His apostles, cannot receive the light of the glorious Gospel or enjoy sweet fellowship with the Lord. "How can ye believe, which receive honour one of another, and seek not the honour that cometh from God only?" John 6:44. "But if our gospel be hid, it is hid to them that are lost: in whom the god of this world hath blinded the minds of them which believe

not, lest the light of the glorious gospel of Christ, who is the image of God, should shine unto them." 2 Cor. 4:3-4.

God speaks to us through the law, which was established unto the faithful, during the Old Testament and is completed through Christ in the New Testament. God sent prophet after prophet to warn the people to strictly obey the law. God sent apostles and teachers to urge us to carefully obey the New Testament teachers. Will we suffer the same lack of faith and obedience, such as the children of Israel did? "If any man think himself to be a prophet, or spiritual, let him acknowledge that the things that I write unto you are the commandments of the Lord." I Cor. 14:37. We are wonderfully blessed, that God has so well preserved His Holy Word down through the ages, unto this generation. How do we show our appreciation unto our Lord? God speaks to you, will each of us be ready when He calls?

The Holy Bible is God's Word to humanity. Its truth endureth forever, such as no other book will. It is the law book, which the great Judge will use on the day of judgment. Christ prayed for His followers, "I pray not that thou shouldest

take them out of the world, but that thou shouldest keep them from the evil. They are not of the world, even as I am not of the world. Sanctify them through thy truth: thy word is truth." John 17:15-17. Do we know His Word? Will He know us when He comes? It all depends upon how we use our time and our talents, while here upon the earth. "He that rejecteth me, and receiveth not my words, hath one that judgeth him: the word that I have spoken, the same shall judge him in the last day." John 12:48.

The Holy Bible is not a dead book, in it we live and move and have our being. Upon its understanding and observance, depends whether we will spend eternity in the bliss of Heaven or in the damnation of Hell. It will cleanse us of all sin, "Now ye are clean through the word which I have spoken unto you." John 15:3. Are we satisfied to live in the darkness of sin? "The statutes of the Lord are right, rejoicing the heart; the commandment of the Lord is pure, enlightening the eyes." Psa. 19:8. The nations of the world are spending millions to purify the natural things of life, so that men's natural lives will not be contaminated. "Thy

Word is very pure; therefore, thy servant loveth it." Psa. 119:140.

Let us meditate upon the thoughts some noted men give us concerning God's Word: A lifeboat may have a tasteful bend and beautiful decorations, but these are not the qualities for which I prize it; it was my salvation from the howling sea. So, the interest which a regenerate soul takes in the Bible, is founded on a personal application to the heart of the saving truth which it contains.

The Bible differs from all other books in its perpetual freshness. This characteristic will be recognized only by those who know the Book, in that intimate way which comes from living with it, as with a member of one's family. I mention this first because it is one of the first unique properties of the Bible, which impressed me after I began to believe in Christ. It is a very remarkable fact that the Bible never becomes exhausted. never acquires a monotonous trend, never diminishes in its power of responsiveness to the quickened soul who comes to it. It is indeed a fountain of living water. The fountain is the same, but the water is always fresh and always refreshing. We

can compare this to nothing but many times that which we find in a living companion, whom we love and to whom we go for help and fellowship. New conditions evoke new responses and so it is with the Bible. As a living book, it adapts itself to the new phases of our experience and the new conditions in which we find ourselves. From the most familiar passage there comes again and again a new message: just as our familiar friend or companion will have something new to say, as changed conditions and new situations require it from time to time.

Do we value the fellowship of one who is wise and true and loving? Then we shall prize the words which He speaks to us. What a treasure we have in the Holy Book of God. We need to prepare our hearts to hear and obey, what God speaks to us through His Word.

The Bible has been my guide in perplexity, and my comfort in trouble. It has roused me when declining and animated me in languor. Other writings may be good, but they want certainty and force. The Bible carries its own credentials along with it and has proven spirit and life to my soul. In other writings I

hear the voice of a stranger or servant. In the Bible I hear the language of my Father and my Friend. Other books contain only the picture of bread or food. The Bible presents me with real manna and feeds me with the bread of life.

THE CHRISTIAN HOME

The nearest thing to heaven on earth is the Christian family and home, where husband and wife, parents and children, live together in love and peace, devoted to God and to each other. By way of contrast, the nearest thing to hell on earth is the ungodly home, broken by sin and iniquity, where parents quarrel and bicker and separate, and where children are given over to the forces of wickedness to be brought up with scarcely any training at all.

The word "home" likely takes your mind back across the years, and for some the mind goes across hundreds of miles of space – to the spot which will be forever hallowed in your memories among all places on earth. You are reminded of the place where you grew up as a boy, or as a girl, playing around the yard with brothers and sisters and neighbor children,

and where you sat around the old range stove on a winter evening with your mother and dad and the rest of the family. There are several things about that old home-place which are not true about any other spot on earth, as far as you are concerned.

In this message we want to see what the Bible says about the duties of the various members of the family to each other and to the Lord.

DUTIES OF WIVES TO THEIR HUSBANDS

The Christian wife is to be subject to her husband. Ephesians 5:22-23 says, "Wives, submit yourselves unto your own husbands, as unto the Lord. For the husband is the head of the wife even as Christ is the head of the church."

Marriage is not a 50-50 proposition. The husband and

the wife are not to be jointly in the place of headship. Our Lord plainly says, "The husband is the head of the wife." This does not mean that the wife is less important in the home than the husband or that she is to be a slave of the husband, but it does mean that she is to submit to the leadership role of her husband. The only exception would be if he asks her to violate clear scriptural teachings (Acts 5:29).

The Lord commands husbands to love their wives, and if the husband loves his wife as Christ loved the church, she will have no difficulty with being subject to him. When problems arise (and they will arise), they should be carefully discussed together. A vote should be taken. If both agree – good. But in the case of a tie (the wife votes one way and the husband votes the other), then the husband should cast the deciding vote. The husband should assume the final leadership in the home.

The wife is to respect and admire her husband. Ephesians 5:33 says, "Let every one of you (husbands) so love his wife even as himself; and the wife see that she reverence her husband."

The wife should respect her husband. This seems to be true

even for the wife who has an unsaved husband (1 Peter 3:1). What kind of life are you living before your husband? Does he see in you true Christian living? Are you cheerful, loving, loyal, and obedient? Some wives drive their husbands away from Christ because they don't respect them. Instead of being cheerful and obedient, they are noted for preaching and nagging. Nothing breaks the spirit of a man more quickly than a nagging wife.

The Christian wife is to be a keeper at home. Titus 2:4-5 says, "Teach the young women to be sober, to love their husbands, to love their children, to be discreet, chaste, keepers at home."

The home is to be the sphere of the woman's influence. There are too many families that have such a high standard of living that mother has to work away from home to help pay the bills. Then in the evening, when happy family activities should take place, mother's energy is all spent, and pressing duties don't permit her that happy fellowship. There may be some exceptions, but generally speaking, the father is to be the breadwinner and the mother is to be the keeper at home.

DUTIES OF HUSBANDS TO THEIR WIVES

The husband is to honor and respect his wife. We are

instructed in 1 Corinthians 7:3, "Let the husband render unto the wife due benevolence."

The husband is to show due courtesies to his wife. It is pathetic to see how some young men can play the part of a gentlemen, be courteous, gracious, and show respect to young ladies when they are courting them - and then after marriage, they come home and scold and nag and become sullen and bitter. The Christian husband is to remember that it is no easy thing for his wife to keep house, care for the children, and experience the vexing things that come along with the daily duties of home life. Let the husband render to his wife due courtesies.

The husband is to consider her physical frailty. I Peter 3:7 admonishes, "Husbands, dwell with them according to knowledge, giving honor unto the wife, as unto the weaker vessel."

The husband is to keep in mind that his wife is generally speaking physically more frail than he. Each husband should be careful not to create additional unnecessary work for his wife. And yet when some husbands leave the house in the morning, it seems like a hurricane had gone through, and when they come home at night it looks as if they brought half the mud from the riverbed in on the carpet! If we husbands would close our doors and hang up our clothes, we may have more pleasant wives.

The husband is to truly love his wife. Colossians 3:19 says, "Husbands, love your wives, and be not bitter against them."

The husband is demonstrate true affection for his wife. He should tell her that he loves her, and he is to treat her with the same love and gentleness and kindness he showed her while he was courting her. How long is it, husbands, since you remembered her with those little tokens of love (a box of candy or a bouquet of flowers) which you were eager to shower upon her during courtship days? If you have been neglecting this duty - go to your wife, apologize for your thoughtlessness, take out your family Bible, read the record of your marriage, and brighten up that old love! If husbands and wives would work as hard to keep each other as they once did to catch each other, most domestic home problems would be forever solved. The spirit of courtship needs to be continued throughout married life.

DUTIES OF CHILDREN TO THEIR PARENTS

Children should honor their parents. God says in Ephesians 6:2, "Honor thy father and mother; which is the first commandment with promise."

It is the duty of every child to respect and honor his parents. If you are inclined to be ashamed of them, remember that they cared for you when you were altogether unable to care for yourself. We sometimes forget that our mothers endangered their lives for our sakes: we are ungrateful for the weary toil of our fathers; we fail to appreciate the many sleepless nights that they went through in order that we might be comfortable. Each of us owes his parents honor and respect and courtesy.

Children should accept instruction from parents. We read in Proverbs 1:8, "My son, hear the instruction of thy father, and forsake not the law of thy mother."

That admonition is very simple. Children can easily understand it. It is wise to heed the

instructions of parents because the advice and mandates which Christian parents give are generally intended for the welfare of the child.

Children should diligently obey their parents. Children are instructed in Colossians 3:20, "Children, obey your parents in all things, for this is well pleasing unto the Lord."

One of the most beautiful Scriptures regarding the childhood of Jesus is the one which says, "He went down to Nazareth and was subject unto them." If Jesus, the eternal Son of God, was subject to family authority, then certainly every child ought to obey his parents. One of the saddest New Testament Scriptures is the one that says, in the last days children shall be "disobedient to parents." A child should never call his dad "the old man" and his mother, "the old lady." Children treat your parents as you'll wish you had treated them when you say your last good-bye to them and when you take that last look at mother and daddy as they lie before you in their caskets.

DUTIES OF PARENTS TO THEIR CHILDREN

Parents should teach their

children. Deuteronomy 6:6-7 says, "And these words which I command thee this day shall be in thine heart; and thou shalt teach them diligently unto thy children, and shall talk of them when thou sittest in thine house, when thou walkest by the way, and when thou liest down, and when thou risest up."

Bear in mind that every child is born into this world with a sinful nature, and that the cute cooing baby in his cradle will soon demonstrate that he has a will of his own. He will lustily scream if he doesn't get his own way. Thus, every child needs to be taught diligently. Reading and quoting the Bible in your home should be just as natural as talking about the weather. Teach them the way of salvation. Read to them from wholesome literature. Memorize Bible verses with them. It is amazing how much truth a child's mind can absorb.

Parents should be good examples for their children. The passage in Deuteronomy 6:6 says, "And these words...shall be in thine heart, and thou shalt teach them."

The Word of God must first be in the parents' hearts! Children are great imitators. We have all seen little girls wearing the clothes of older persons. They want to be like mother. The best way to "train up a child in the way he should go" is to go that way yourself. Most children want to be the kind of man or woman their mother and dad is.

Parents should discipline their children. Proverbs 29:15 says "The rod and reproof give wisdom, but a child left to himself bringeth his mother to shame."

The New Testament says that children shall be brought up in the "nurture and admonition of the Lord" (Ephesians 6:4). The word for "nurture" is actually "scourging." Some don't use the rod, but if you want to ruin your children, just dance to the tune of their every desire and you can be assured that the job of ruination will soon be complete. I have seen children throw themselves on the floor and kick and scream and insist on getting their own way, and the parents said, "Let them alone, they must express themselves!" God have mercy on parents who fail to discipline and admonish their children. The Bible tells of God's judgment on one family because the father (who was a good man engaged in the service of the Lord) failed to discipline his sons (1 Samuel 3:13).

May God help us to live "at home" so sweetly, so tenderly, and so lovingly – that the memories we make within our homes may be music in the heart, sweeter than the songs that angels sing, and may our family circles be unbroken in the world to come

TRUST NOT THE LYING WORDS

"Trust ye not in lying words." Jer. 7:4.

Lying words are not so scarce today as one might think. Every newspaper has long articles on events of the day, and it is almost impossible in certain instances to place confidence in the truths of the material pertaining to prohibition. Then there are street peddlers of patent medicines and similar articles. Their pills will cure almost every ailment under heaven and those that it will not cure they will relieve, their liniment is good for any ache, bruise or pain that one may ever have. Lying words meet us when we go to town to trade, they meet us when we travel along the highway staring at us from the signs along the way. In every walk of life, we meet them.

One of the most peculiar things about these lying words is the fact

that we believe them sometimes and quite often when it is very apparent that they are lying words. If you think this is not true just think back in your own life and see if you have not at some not very far distant time bought some article that has been misrepresented to you by the salesman. Or possibly you have made a friend who has deceived you. The deception could have been readily seen in most instances if you would have only been as observant as you should.

The prophet in this particular instance is talking to a people who are being deceived by lying words, and the deception is not about some cure all medicine or a small trinket or even a horse or farm, but it does concern the thing that is most dear to man and that is his soul's welfare.

They were believers. They believed in the true God and

went up to his temple to worship. I believe they were as sincere in their religious life as most of the professing Christian world is in this present age. I think they were almost as active in their worship as the people of today are. Although they were only required to go to the temple to worship but a few times a year they probably entered this place about as often as many Christians do today even though they can meet every week and sometimes several times in a week

These people were placing their soul's welfare in the fact that they did go up to the temple to worship. It was the temple of the Lord, the place where God had met their parents in days long past. At the altar of this temple Solomon had brought sacrifices of thousands in number and God had seen and heard with forgiving eye and ear. God had blessed his people abundantly in times past when they came up to this house to worship. So, they reasoned within themselves that He would hear themselves in the same way.

Today many a man and woman belong to a certain denomination because their father and mother belonged to it. In the past it has had great and strong leaders who were respected and

looked up to as men of God. In the past they were blessed and prospered, and numbers came flocking into the church. Indeed, there has been every evidence to prove that the church has been approved by God and so they remain in that church saying that this has been the church of God.

However, with all this evidence in favor of the trust they were placing in their temple worship the man of God came forth and intimated that they were placing their trust in lying words.

What? It is possible that they can be wrong. It is true that God has met their fathers in this temple, and can it be that He will not meet them there?

The next verse gives them to understand that there is more to salvation than mere temple worship. They must live lives that He can approve so they will receive the salvation they were expecting. In this particular instance they must repent. They must change their ways and doings. In addition to coming to the temple there must be a life of justice and righteousness. This might also be the message of the prophet today to those who trust only in their church membership and their belief in God and Jesus Christ for their salvation.

It is sad enough when we believe the lies of others but when we lie to ourselves and then try to believe those lies it is almost beyond our comprehension. That is exactly what those people did. Through a process of false reasoning they allowed themselves to believe they were saved when they were not. I would say I believe that today there are thousands and hundreds of thousands who try to do exactly the same thing these people of

Judea did, and I further believe their process of reasoning is the same and that they will be lost if they do not repent and amend their ways and doings.

It would be interesting to trace the reasoning of these people, but it is more profitable for us to take the lesson that is given and apply it to ourselves.
