NORMAL

Many are mourning the passing of what was considered normal. The coronavirus has changed relationships, kept people home, and introduced controversy about simple human activities.

Demonstrations and riots have highlighted perceived discrimination and alleged undeserved privilege. There have been exertions made to remove reminders of the past, whether legendary or factual. In both situations the authority of the government at every level has been questioned and repulsed.

The various governmental regulations concerning the coronavirus have been questioned and disregarded. The regulations issued after study

by acknowledged experts have been disregarded and criticized by other experts. Often the disregard of regulations shows a desire to be free of governmental authority. There are conspiracy theories abounding. Politicians and other public figures have failed to act as statemen, being more interested in gaining political advantage.

The establishment of civil government by God is often misunderstood. Realizing the sinfulness and wickedness of human beings, God knew that men could not govern themselves. Civil authority was established to control the lawlessness of the unredeemed. To prevent governments from overstepping their authority, constitutions have been devised to provide

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guidelines for governing. As great the crime of breaking through these legal boundaries, it does not compare to breaking God's Word and His boundaries.

The demonstrations and riots may emphasize discrimination and misgovernment. The entire human race is subject to sin and imperfection. The powerful who rule are no better than those whom they try to rule. Governments that ignore the will of God will at some point be dealt with by God. It is not a pleasing sight when the judgment of God is laid upon people, including those who ignore or ridicule Him, or take lightly their use of power. Their lack of perception may endanger those they rule. Those who oppose governments, while disregarding the role of God in the creation and its subsequent history, also fail in their ideals. To perfect the imperfect can only be accomplished by God who originally created government to control evil in this world.

Many who have longed for the return of their normal will be disappointed. Time does not stand still. The future will be different than the past. Even with containment of the virus through human activities or a vaccine, there will be reminders of it. There may be restrictions on certain activities or there may be a requirement to receive the vaccine.

The demonstrations and riots will be remembered. There may be governmental action instituting changes in public policy. There will be a period of rebuilding of the property destroyed. There may be changes in attitudes and relationships, but without a spiritual change it will only be a forced and resented change. Only when people realize that all people are created by God with the same blood flowing in their arteries and veins, can there be a change in these relationships. Deep, sincere relationships can never be produced by laws and regulations. The capacity for deep personal relationships can only be forged through a common understanding of God and His desire for His creation.

Heart-felt relationship can only be truly established through the change of heart and life wrought through the death, burial, resurrection, and ascension of Jesus Christ. This provides the only way to reestablish a relationship with God. The sins of His creation have broken the intended relationship that God desired. God desires a

people who please and honor Him. Humans have failed in that relationship. God has graciously extended to them the opportunity to reestablish His desired relationship.

The laws and regulations adopted by governments attempt to control the people who disregard God's will and civil laws. His purpose is to enable His people to live peaceful and productive lives. It would be ideal if those who govern were mindful of God's will, but that is impossible without a personal relationship with God through Jesus Christ. Civil government is to be obeyed and properly honored,

but never defied by believers.

Our normal of the past may have been prosperous, comfortable, entertaining, and quite normal for the surrounding culture. That normal may disappear. We may need to be prepared to live under more regulation, under more unspiritual suspicions and we may have to risk more than in the past to continue to serve Him as He wishes

August 2020 Study Questions

August 2 - Luke 18:9-34

How does the parable of the Pharisee and tax collector help us understand Justification?

How do little children help us understand the nature of faith?

How do riches limit our ability to trust God?

How is Peter like or not like the rich ruler?

Have you ever been dismayed by the depth of your spiritual blindness? When and why?

Commentary: In our finite state we constantly keep running into our inability to comprehend the infinite nature of God. It is a great blessing to our hearts when our own righteousness stands revealed as filthy rags in comparison to the righteousness of God. We have nothing of our own to recommend ourselves as worthy of God's blessing. We try to bargain for some goodness we can do in exchange for eternal life. But God exposes the limits of our will for perfection. Rather than walking away sorrowfully we can accept Christ's perfection as the only substitute worthy of eternal praise. But here begins the lifelong struggle in our spiritual lives. God's plan is seldom very visible to our eyes. We are busy with living and planning for our future and easily resist the imparting of Christ's life in us (sanctification). But God is infinite in His patience with the disciples of Jesus though we be blind to His plans. Sometimes, very slowly, as we learn to walk by faith in the newness of His resurrection life, God's plan begins to reveal Jesus and His transforming power working through us so that others can see what this life in Christ is like.

August 9 - Luke 18:35-19:10

What gets the blind man's attention?

What is suggestive of faith in his cry?

How does a blind man "seeing" help illustrate the nature of faith?

What similarities do you see between the blind man and Zacchaeus?

How do you think Zacchaeus felt when Jesus addressed him by name?

What is the difference between works of faith and works of law?

Commentary: Most of us are familiar with thinking of ourselves as servants of God. He leads, we follow. He commands, we obey. He teaches, we listen. But if we think only in these terms we miss out on a wonderful truth. God is working for us. If you heard God saying to you, "What do you want Me to do for you," how would you respond? What is your greatest need that only God can provide? And when He gave you what you asked would you ever stop glorify-

ing Him? Zacchaeus also received far more than he imagined. He hoped to just catch a glimpse of Jesus. Instead he had the honor of hosting him at his home at Jesus' request. As a tax collector, one of the worst of sinners, his generous response out of his own wealth, was but a token of what he received from Jesus. May our lives reflect that we are indeed servants of the only true God and are beneficiaries of a boundless grace that is beyond imagination for all eternity.

August 16 - Luke 19:11-40

According to Luke what assumption is Jesus speaking against in this parable?

How do assumptions influence what we believe?

What is the negative impact of this assumption as it is described in the parable?

How do you think the owners of the foal reacted to the disciples' explanation?

What expectation does Zachariah 9:9 contain that is the hope of the people as Jesus enters Jerusalem?

Why do the Pharisees want Jesus to rebuke His disciples?

Commentary: Luke begins our study this week with a truly relevant observation. Among Jesus' many followers there was a common assumption that the kingdom of God would appear immediately. The parable of the minas was meant to correct that assumption. Another example of this assumption at work is in the previous chapter beginning with verse 31. Jesus describes all that will happen to Him and His disciples are clueless. They are preparing for His inauguration as Messiah and their own ascendency as members of His cabinet. They have no place for a cross in their planning. Our present reality during a pandemic reveals many assumptions at work amongst us. We have had to retreat from any notion that there will be a quick fix. General Conference has gone from rescheduled to cancelled. Some churches are open and others not depending

on local, county, and state decisions. Some see the present circumstances as though they are mostly a big hoax. Others may be consumed by many fears. Some of our assumptions about the present pandemic will die slowly in protracted denial. Other assumptions may withstand many attacks as to their accuracy. What is certain is that Satan wants to divide us by encouraging us to fight amongst ourselves. But it is more certain that our Lord Jesus Christ is more than able to lead us through these uncertain times in ways that strengthen all of us in our faith in Him above all assumptions and controversies. May He be glorified in our midst.

August 23 - Luke 19:41-20:19

As Jesus weeps over Jerusalem why does He refer to it as "your day"?

What historical consequence does Jerusalem experience that fulfills Jesus' prophecy?

What other biblical, historical, or contemporary event can you think of that is similar to Jesus' cleansing of the temple?

How many plans do you think the religious leaders developed in trying to kill Jesus?

What answer to the question of authority did the leaders hope to hear from Jesus?

What were the leaders objecting to in the parable of the vinedressers?

Commentary: There are numerous times when we have time to meditate on the sufferings of Christ for our sins. But before He suffered the agony of the cross He wept over Jerusalem. I once read a phrase that said, "The corruption of the best is the worst of all." The hopes of Israel were often associated with Jerusalem. But often the sins of Israel reached their culmination in Jerusalem. As it had done in the past so it would happen again that those in power in Jerusalem would bring God's harshest punishment upon themselves and their descendants by their rejection of God's purposes. This time

they rejected their Messiah, God's own Son. Yet Jesus still chose to do what He could in the moments that He had to change the hearts of those who would listen. He started by cleansing the temple. Daily He confronted the religious leaders time and again with gospel truth and God's condemnation of their hardened hearts. He did so even though in doing so the end result was death. And we thank God that it is not the end of the story.

August 30 - Luke 20:20-47

How were the religious leaders attempting to portray Jesus?

What answer were they hoping to hear from Jesus on the issue of taxes?

What answers does Jesus give to the Sadducees and how did He know them?

What is your answer to Jesus' question about Christ being the son of David?

What is Jesus' concern about the Scribes?

Commentary: The hope of those who opposed Jesus were to portray Him as a messianic pretender seeking to throw Rome out of Judea. It was a long shot since Jesus had not organized any revolutionary troops or supplies with which to launch such a campaign. But if they could get Him to say something that could be framed in that perspective surely, they could count on Pilate to put down any appearance of rebellion. Taxes are always a flash point. But Jesus turned the tables on His adversaries leaving them empty handed with nothing with which they could accuse Him. The Sadducees thought they could diminish His messianic mystique with a contrived scenario from which He could not escape. They fared no better. Then Jesus asked them a question which they could not answer for it can only be apprehended by faith. The incarnate God, fully man and son of David, yet fully God and Lord of all.

THE LEAVEN OF THE PHARISEES

In Israel, bread was often called "leaven." Jesus had fed four thousand people from seven loaves and two small fishes. Many from all parts of the country came to see Jesus and to hear Him speak. He had healed so many that everywhere they were talking about Jesus. Many thought Jesus was the Messiah whom the prophets had prophesied would come to save the nation of Israel. He would be their King and all other nations would be subject to His rule.

The Pharisees were a sect of Jews who became the religious leaders of the people. Jesus criticized the Pharisees because they did not have compassion and love for others. They lived extremely strict religious lives, making it hard for themselves and bitter for others. They taught the law of Moses to the people but changed many things to suit themselves. Jesus said that by their traditions they had made the law of none effect. They were like some of our lawyers today. They were not always honest and truthful but twisted the law to suit themselves. The Pharisees did not like Jesus. He was becoming too popular to suit them. They would tempt Jesus with hard questions and try to get Him to say or do something that they might accuse Him or arrest Him. Jesus always

told the truth and sometimes the truth hurts - especially when He told about some of the things, they had done wrong. One-time Jesus said, "Woe unto you, scribes and Pharisees, hypocrites! For ye are like unto whited sepulchres, which indeed appear beautiful outward, but are within full of dead men's bones and all uncleanness." He also called them serpents, a generation of vipers. Jesus did not mince words, so they planned to kill Him. The Sadducees were another sect of the Jews. They did not believe that people who died would live again.

Jesus said to His disciples, "Beware of the leaven of the Pharisees and Sadducees." The disciples thought that He said this because they had forgotten to bring bread along. Jesus said, "O ye of little faith, why do ye reason among yourselves because you have brought no bread?" Jesus could give them bread to eat as He did the four thousand, but He was not talking about that kind of

bread. Jesus was teaching them something more important. He was warning the disciples about the doctrine or teaching of the Pharisees. He called it "leaven" or "bread", but it was a kind of bread they should leave alone. It was something that would lead them in the wrong way and poison their minds.

Jesus wants us to know the truth. The truth is the Word of God. He wants us to be loving and kind and willing to help others. Today we have many doctrines and teachings in the world that are not the truth. They are not from God but are some man's ideas. Many people fall for these false teachings. We must study God's Word so that we know the truth and the truth will make us free. Then we will know what the leaven of the Pharisees is, and we can refuse the false teachings that others would force upon us.

BACK TO CHURCH

Tomorrow will be a time of importance, perhaps not momentous, but something we are likely to remember better than many normal Sunday

morning worship services of the past. None of us had any inkling that it would take nearly four months (March 15) before having the opportunity to meet face to face again in worship of our Heavenly Father.

Besides this being the first opportunity to meet again, the setting will certainly be different. We will be sitting outside in the area typically used for volleyball. It offers plenty of shade from the summer morning sun but also the distraction of road noise created by traffic on Claus Road. So, it will be an imperfect setting.

But so is our usual setting inside the meeting house for one particularly important reason: we are imperfect creatures who are always bringing our imperfections into our worship of the Lord. So, the biggest struggle we will have to face is not road noise or feeling exposed to curious eyes as we gather outside. Rather it is the same one we face every day.

It is the struggle to surrender our hearts to the Lord who has already redeemed us from the eternal consequences of our sinful, imperfect selves. But just like every Sunday and everyday of the week the Lord offers us His strength with which to subdue the stubbornness and waywardness of our hearts. As we enter, by His strength into this battle, we will experience worship of God, who mercifully overcomes our frailties of the heart and renews our spirit, even amid the imperfections of place and person.

Let me add one further caution as we prepare to meet. There are a variety of opinions concerning Covid-19 and the potential of any of us becoming a source of infection among us. Some believe there is too much hype and little possibility of any of us becoming infected. There is distrust of medical authorities and their claims. There is distrust of government authorities who have used these claims as the basis of their actions. All of us have felt our lives interrupted in various ways including our meeting together. Others amongst us have advocated greater caution, the wearing of masks, and other similar practices to minimize any risks for infection among us.

The coming months and perhaps longer may provide us with greater perspective as to the wisdom of any course of action we choose now or later. In the meantime, we must avoid any temptation to point fingers of blame and attitudes of, "I told you so." This can only sow discord among us, mar our fellowship, and displease the Lord.

We are His flock. He is our Shepherd. He directs our paths. And He will show us what we need to know to draw us closer to each other as He draws us closer to Himself. So, let us humble our opinions of our own minds and seek His mind among us. This is the heart of worship.

"For the kingdom of heaven is as a man traveling into a far country, who called his own servants, and delivered unto them his goods. And unto one he gave five talents, to another two, and to another one; to every man according to his several ability; and straightway took his journey. Then he that had received the five talents went and traded with the same, and made them other five talents. And likewise he that had received two. he also gained other two. But he that had received one went and digged in the earth, and hid his lord's money." Matt. 25:14-18.

The Lord gave talents to each of His servants. Whoever

we are, at whatever place we are and whatever our state in life is: if we are one of our Lord's servants, we have been trusted with some talents. This parable definitely tells us that we are given according to our several ability. The Lord definitely knows what our ability is, we may know in part what it is, but others know very little about it. With these facts in mind, how well do we use the talents which our Lord loaned to us? Is it not true that so often we spend more time, comparing our talents with others, regretting that we are not as well blessed as others and perhaps belittling what others do with their talents: rather than trading with and

developing our own talents?

Let us meditate a little: Do we not each have very great opportunities? If we have the right use of our mind, a reasonably healthy body, food, clothing, and shelter, do we not have a great opportunity to labor for our Lord? We are blessed with a knowledge of God's Word, a vast opportunity to learn more of it, religious liberty, the freedom to go and do practically as we please in His service? How would it be if we could not gather together to worship and build up one another in that most Holy faith, if we could not publicly or even privately talk and reason with others about our Saviour, if we could not worship how, when, and where we wish?

"And that servant, which knew his Lord's will, and prepared not himself, neither did according to his will, shall be beaten with man stripes." Luke 12:47. Notice, first is to know his Lord's will, do you know it, or do you not have any opportunities to know it? Second is to prepare oneself. We must accept Christ's plan of salvation for our individual self, we must use the proper methods that we might be

cleansed of our sins, we must live differently than we did while in the clutches of sin, and we must grow in grace and in the knowledge of the truth. Third we must do our Lord's will, every last line of it. If we willingly fail in one point, we will be punished for it.

"He that believeth on him is not condemned: but he that believeth not is condemned already, because he hath not believed in the name of the only begotten Son of God. And this is the condemnation that light is come into the world. and men loved darkness rather than light, because their deeds were evil." John 3:18-19. Faith is the first essential that we may serve our Lord and Saviour, How sad when human beings have so many opportunities and are too lazy, too stubborn, too much a lover of sin and too unappreciative to make use of the provisions of God for salvation and happiness. How ignorant a person is often considered, who will not use the various means of natural light that he or she may see, do, and progress in this natural life. Is not the person far more ignorant and

just plain foolish, who will not accept the light of the glorious Gospel of Christ. Yes, who will love darkness and serve the darkness of sin, rather than the eternal light of the Light of the World.

"For by thy words that shalt be justified, and by thy words thou shalt be condemned." Matt. 12:37. We also notice that our opportunities may be a curse to us as well as a blessing, if we do not make good use of them. "Now he that planteth and he that watereth are one; and every man shall receive his own reward according to his own labour." I Cor. 3:8. Our Lord knows and He is also able to amply reward, "But he that doeth wrong shall receive for the wrong which he hath done: and there is no respect of persons." Col. 3:25. Do these Scriptures urge us, warn us,

convince us, and literally compel us, to make the best use of our opportunities that we possibly can?

"See that ye refuse not him that speaketh. For if they escaped not who refused him that spake on earth, much more shall not we escape, if we turn away from him that speaketh from heaven." Heb. 12:25. THE TRUE CHURCH

"Which is the true church?"

This is a question that is being asked by multitudes of the human family today. If it can be truly answered it surely ought to be. There are a vast number of churches and on some truths their belief and teachings are directly opposite. Some of them must be wrong, or they may all be wrong. They cannot all be right.

The church of God, the original church, was true because it was "the pillar and ground of the truth." The true church now must be a counterpart of that church. The church that was brought about by his divine son surely was true and in accordance with the Father's will. The complete organization of the church being directed by the apostles of Christ as they were moved by God in the person of

his Holy Spirit, surely could not be otherwise than truly right.

Thus, the church was started in complete harmony with God. Why the conditions today? "An enemy hath done this." On the day of Pentecost when the disciples were being filled with the Holy Ghost, very likely the devil was busy gathering his host together for a long battle and a strong battle through the ages to come.

We see the results of this never-ending warfare against the true church. His methods of persuading and deceiving and turning aside the followers of Christ are innumerable. Today we see the results of this unceasing spiritual conflict. Because of the many ways introduced it is difficult for man to find the true way. "Because straight is the gate and

narrow is the way which leadeth unto life, and few there be that find it."

Our Roman Catholic friends claim they were the original church and because of that they are the true church now. Whether they were the original church or not we will not discuss. It really does not make any difference. Not what a church was once but what it is now should be our chief concern. Here is a truth we must grasp – Because a church has once been true is not a proof or assurance that it is forever true. When a church fails to walk in the simple way that God has marked out in his word it is no longer the true church.

We regard the church that was restored through Alexander Mack as one that was true in God's sight because it was obedient to his holy word. It was not through heated argument that they grasped this way, but through much prayerful study and meditation.

It is possible for a church which once lived close to the Divine word as this church did, to drift away. It may become a fine social and charitable organization with excellent government, but that does not continue it as the true church of God.

We sometimes hear it said that we should just do the best

we can and not worry about the church, because the church will come around all right by and by. We must remember however, that a backslidden church never returns. An individual who wanders away may sometimes return, but never in history of the world has a backslidden church returned.

Again, it is claimed that the church must change "because the world, in its methods and customs, is changing and progressing." Because men can travel in the film of air that envelops the earth, or because the human voice can be reproduced across the continent over wires or through the air is no reason why God's people should not love his word and in humble obedience worship him in spirit and in truth.

If we claim that only the church that obeys God's word literally, as given in the New Testament, is the true church we are termed as "narrow." They may claim that if we accept the so called "fundamental truths" we are all right, no matter what church we belong to. They draw a line, however. Another draws a line at the rejection of water baptism. Someone else draws a line if the divinity of Christ is rejected, or if the "revelations" of Joseph Smith or Mary Baker Eddy are not accepted. Even the

infidel draws a line when he says, "That murderers will never get to heaven, if there is a heaven." Every person sooner or later, draws a limit line somewhere for man's salvation

Instead of pondering over the

human opinions of men, should we not see where Jesus draws the line? "Not every one that saith unto me, Lord, Lord, shall enter into the kingdom of heaven; but he that doeth the will of my Father which is in heaven." (Matt. 7:21.)

CHRISTIAN UNITY

Notwithstanding its hopelessness, there is probably not a band or group of professing Christians but would rejoice to see all such people united into one great body rather than to be divided up into the great number of groups as they now are. And efforts are being made to bring about this desirable condition among some of the larger bodies. It is usually the smaller groups that are most irreconcilable, because of the introduction and prevalence of conditions upon which they hold very decided convictions. And being in the minority, they are powerless to alter these conditions. and so a new group is formed in keeping with the conviction of the minority. In this way many of the groups have been founded, and, without considering the causes, the minority is, of course, charged with bringing about the division.

The most regrettable fact here

is, that no religious body has stood for any reasonable length of time without "losing its first love," so to speak, and encouraging and tolerating the introduction of practices foreign to the original order of things, which naturally causes schism and dissention in the body. And this, developed to its logical conclusion, results in division and final separation on the part of the loyal and faithful ones, and thus a new body is formed.

Another notable fact here is, that no body that ever thus drifted away from its original platform and practice ever reformed or returned to its original principles and practices, and in this drifting the course has invariably been worldward. Many churches that originally were plain and separate from the world have drifted with the tide until no semblance of separation from the world is discernible amongst them. In such

cases if a number however small, wish to maintain the original idea of things, the only recourse is protest and petition. When these fail the only alternative is separation, or suppression of convictions for the sake of unity.

And since mankind is inclined to substitute the more convenient for the more inconvenient, and to be less, rather than more, or even as much, as God demands, history shows that no church that ever started with affusion for baptism ever discarded this for immersion And no church that started with single immersion for baptism ever discarded this for trine immersion. while in many instances affusion has been substituted for immersion, and single immersion for trine immersion. It is known to all church. historians that trine immersion was the general practice among orthodox Christians until the close of the twelfth century, with here and there an isolated case of trine affusion, and for a time single immersion was practiced in Spain after the year A. D. 360, when it was introduced by one Eunomius, a seceder from the Arians who, as other Christians, practiced trine immersion

In fact, neither affusion nor single immersion came into general use until after the Reformation. And

even at the present time when it comes to number, trine immersion has the lead about nine to one over single immersion, and the trine action, including trine affusion, leads about fifteen to one over the single action.

Now to be united in the practice of baptism we should have to return to the original trine immersion, which the early church fathers who wrote on the subject of baptism, tell us they practiced and that they got it, not from history, nor from each other but from Christ and the apostles, and from the great commission as recorded by Saint Matthew. (Matt. 28:19.)

The following which we quote from one of our exchanges, is to the point here:

"Make the Gospel of Christ the rallying ground upon which all controverted points and questions are settled.

"This course is the exact opposite of the one which most people follow when they try to get together. They would rather ignore doctrinal differences, thereby hoping to put an end to their quarrels, than to find what the Word and the will of the Lord is in the matter. But such evasiveness, while it may bring a semblance of unity, leads away from the Gospel of Christ and the salvation which

its message brings. The Bereans were more wise, 'more noble' than this, for they 'received the word with all readiness of mind, and searched the scriptures daily, whether these things were so' (Acts 17:11). We recognize that 'all scripture is given by inspiration of God' (II Tim. 3:16); that 'God... hath in these last days spoken unto us by his Son' (Heb. 1:1,2); that the writings of the apostles, being given by inspiration of God, 'are the commandments of the Lord' (I Cor. 4:37); and that there is a fearful penalty for trifling with God's Word (Gal. 1:8.9: II Thess. 1:7-9: Heb. 12:25; II John 10,11; Rev. 22:18, 19). Instead therefore of ignoring doctrinal differences, as many do, and making human likes and dislikes the basis of our fellowship, our unification of standards should be based strictly upon the Gospel of Christ. Such a course not only brings us together in unity of the faith and Spirit of Him who has bought us with His precious blood. 'If we walk in the light as he is in the light, we have fellowship one with another' (I John 1:7); and not only so, but under such circumstances we can say, 'Truly our fellowship is with the Father, and with his Son Jesus Christ' (V. 4). 'What saith the Scripture?' is the only ground upon which a Heaven-approved

unity can be built." – Gospel Herald, July 24, P. 371.

How true the statement, "What saith the Scripture?' is only ground upon which a Heaven-approved unity can be built." Especially so since "all scripture is given by inspiration of God", and "God... hath in these last days spoken to us by his Son", and "the gospel of Christ is the power of God unto salvation" (Rom. 1:16, 17); and "the writings of the apostles, being given by inspiration of God, 'are the commandments of the Lord." This proposition seems so reasonable, and so scriptural, a union on this basis ought to be easily effected by all sincere seekers of a union on gospel grounds.

Now, suppose we try a little and see how it will work out; see if there is a probability of effecting a union on the gospel basis. A union on any other basis would not be worth the time it would take to effect it.

First, then, let us take up the inspiration of the scriptures. We are told "all scripture is given by inspiration of God, and is profitable for doctrine, for reproof, for correction, for instruction in righteousness, that the man of God may be perfect thoroughly furnished unto all good works." Now, how about it? Is it all inspired?

Fundamentalist: "Yes, sure." Modernist: "No, sir, not all of it." Well, who are these Modernists? Are they church men? Sure, college-bred, mostly. No use, then talking union, for if the scriptures be not inspired, then anyone may reject such parts of it as do not suit him. But who of us poor mortals would venture to draw a line between the human and the divine, but the inspired and the uninspired? We could find no basis of union on this line. We may as well reject all as a part of it.

Then, too, if all scripture is "profitable" for something, and Paul says it is, "that the man of God may be perfect, thoroughly furnished unto all good works," how about non-essentials? Suppose we start out to unite on the essentials rejecting the non-essentials. Who will venture to draw a line here - a line between the essential and the non-essential? The Modernist denies the atonement, so that would do away with the "blood that cleansed from sin", which automatically does away with faith; and if we can unite on a platform that has no blood and no faith, then why repent? Why not unite on this platform and just call it a social club instead of a church?

But dropping the Modernist, how about the regular Fundamentalists?

Is there a possibility for them to unite? Hardly. For ask them what about baptism, feet washing and the Lord's Supper? And the great mass immediately cry out: "Non-essential!" And so on with much of the gospel. Then such parts of it as men say is non-essential may as well never have been written. But who of us has sufficient discernment as to be able to select the non-essentials in an inspired Book? Especially since inspiration says it is "profitable", good for something.

Now a union based on a part of the gospel is not the kind we want. As stated above, to be heavenapproved it must be founded on the gospel, not on a part of it. Then, too, we wonder how much better a union on non-essentials, denying the essentiality of a part of the Book, would be, then on Modernism, denying the inspiration of a part of it?

Yes, we'd rejoice to see the time when we could have Christian unity based on the Bible, not on a part of it. But as suggested in the opening statement, somehow it is hard to be optimistic that this will ever be.
