BORDERS AND BRIDGES

The Niagara International Rainbow Bridge connects the cities of Niagara Falls, New York, United States and Niagara Falls, Ontario, Canada. It was completed in 1941 to replace the Honeymoon Bridge which had collapsed in 1938.

The Rainbow Bridge is one of several bridges around the world that connect two countries separated by a river. Cooperation was necessary to build and maintain this shared resource. There are several other bridges that connect the United States and Canada. West of the Great Lakes the two countries share a lengthy land border.

Borders delineate various political jurisdictions. Borders determine the laws and sometimes the customs practiced by those on either side. States, counties,

townships, and municipalities have borders that affect their political operation. Although there are many national laws that apply to all these divisions, yet each of these bodies can enact laws that apply to their jurisdiction.

Borders can become places of contention and irritation between these jurisdictions. Nations do defend their borders. Wars have been fought over the exact location of legal borders. Passports and visas may be necessary to legally enter another country.

Like the jointly planned, built, and maintained Rainbow Bridge, other bridges may provide a means of reducing tension between rival countries or individuals. Tensions can be lessened when psychological bridges are employed to bring better relationships. Cooperation

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on minor projects can bring further cooperation on major events. This may lessen the possibility of warfare between countries or hatred and disagreement between individuals.

The borders and bridges of the political world may provide an illustration of the boundaries and bridges of the Christian Church.

The Church of Christ has been constituted with boundaries for her members. In the Old Testament (Deuteronomy 19:14. Proverbs 23:10) it was recognized as a great crime to remove the landmark of a man's inherited property. The landmarks whether rocks, trees or other methods marking his borders were to be honored and not be moved. If those landmarks were moved, the victim could become landless and lose his inheritance.

The Church is empowered to protect the landmarks of the faith. These timeless landmarks have been established by the Word of God. Removing those landmarks makes uncertain the guidelines that would direct those professing faith. If there are no borders, how can he know how to translate his faith into living? These landmarks are not inventions of men's fertile minds but those established by the Holy Spirit inspiring the human writers of God's Holy Word. These

landmarks include "repentance from dead works, and of faith toward God, Of the doctrines of baptisms, and of laying on of hands, and of resurrection of the dead, and of eternal judgment." (Hebrews 6:1b-2) These landmarks are built upon the foundation of the doctrines of Christ concerning His origin, birth, life, ministry, death, sacrifice, resurrection, ascension, return and rule. These eternal truths serve as the spiritual borders of the Church.

The church also provides bridges for those who are not in a relationship with God through Jesus Christ. The mission of the Church is to reach out to those not in God's Family. The Church must be sharing the message of individual salvation through the sacrifice of Jesus, the sin-bearer. Just as physical bridges need to be built so Christian lives must be built through bridges built by individual believers with those who deny, question, ridicule, or undervalue the price God has paid for each soul.

When shared bridges are built the boundaries are maintained. Neither the United States nor Canada gave up their sovereignty when the Rainbow Bridge was built, but the bridge did require cooperation. The Church must maintain her boundaries of belief and practice, while she builds bridges into the lives of those who need to find Jesus. It would be ironic for the Church to offer the Bridge of Jesus Christ to the lost only to have fallen off the foundation of Jesus Christ and Biblical landmarks.

The boundaries of the Church must be taught in an intelligent manner. Boundaries are not built

on superstitions or fairy tales; they are built on God's Word.

Are you extending the bridge of Jesus Christ to those who are outside the boundaries? Are you helping to maintain the boundaries that will make the offered bridge worthwhile?

THE GOD OF PROMISE

Every time there is a political election all that is heard from the prospective politicians are their promises. There are more promises given then a person can keep up with, which is what the politicians are counting on. If we try to keep the list of every promise uttered by these people, we will have to cut down every tree in North America.

Promises are what life is built upon. Do away with promises and life collapses, as we now know it. At the core of every relationship is a promise.

For the husband and wife, it is a promise "until death do us part." The quality of that marriage relationship depends upon living the promise of the marital vows. Every divorce is based upon breaking some promise.

There was a time when a man

took another man at his word and sealed it with a handshake. There were no contracts. Lawyers never came into the picture. Aman's word was his bond and society seemed to thrive upon that very thing.

Now, it is quite different. When once we took a man at his word, now we assume that he will not keep his word. We look for hidden meanings and loopholes in the agreement. Enter the lawyer. Even though everybody seems to hate a lawyer, lawyers are the first person they call when they get into trouble.

It is impossible to deal with personal relationships apart from calling in some expert on the legal aspect of that relationship. It does not matter what the promises are that we make, there is always the potential of not keeping the promise.

Man's promise is only as good

as the man who makes the promise. This is the problem. Although everybody has good intentions, sometimes things happen that keep that person from honoring his or her promise.

Not so with God. God's promises always align with His nature and character making it impossible for God to lie. God can never contradict Himself. He will always act like Himself, which is a good thing for us. We can rely upon His Word. We can depend upon Him coming through and honoring His promises. That is what makes a relationship with God a very sound and wonderful thing.

It is a sad commentary on our society when there are so many promise breakers. Breaking a promise reflects upon the character of the person doing it.

Quite frankly, it has become a lifestyle in society today. Nobody expects anybody to keep his or her promise. When we enter into a contract, it is page after page that must be authenticated by signature after signature. Then there must be witnesses to that signature. Even then, there is wiggle room for a lawyer to undo the whole thing. The paper contract is not what it used to be.

It was Yogi Berra who made the observation that, "An oral contract

is not worth the paper it's written on." Such can be said today for a written contract. There is no written contract that cannot be undone by some clever attorney.

In contrast to the promise breaker is the promise keeper. I am referring of course, to God. He is the great promise keeper. There is no promise He has ever uttered that He ever broke. This should give us a great deal of confidence in our relationship with God.

God therefore is the expert on making a promise. A promise is of such a nature that it creates expectation. If I promise to give someone \$100.00, they have a corresponding expectation of receiving \$100.00. When God makes a promise, He is creating expectation.

Every promise of God reveals several things about God. It reveals both His nature and character and what we can expect from Him on a personal basis. To understand God's promise is to understand God. He can never promise anything that in any way contradicts His nature or character.

Once I have an expectation of God, I begin to understand what His expectation of me is. Every promise He gives reveals to me what He is expecting from me. I cannot do anything that God has

not promised. I cannot do anything that God has not amply provided for. Every promise creates the expectation of God's provision and God will never be inconsistent with His nature.

To honor the God of promise I need to live a life in complete harmony with His expectations. In His promises, God is opening His heart for me to understand Him and experience Him in the richness of His nature and character. I cannot know all there is to know about God, but I can begin to understand

everything about Him that He has promised in my direction.

A promise is not an end in itself; rather it is a bridge to a personal encounter with God Himself.

Years ago, in Sunday school, we used to sing, "Every promise in the book is mine, mine, mine." We sang it with a great deal of enthusiasm, but rarely did we live it in the power of God's expectation.

PHIL'S PONDERINGS

As we "study to shew ourselves approved unto God..."

November 2020 Study Questions

November 1 - Luke 24:1-12

What do you think was the women's first reaction when they saw the stone rolled away?

How do you react when you see something that you cannot make sense of?

How many were in the tomb?

When did their perplexity turn to, "Aha"?

How many auto mechanics turn a deaf ear as a woman describes her car problems?

What did Peter see that caused him to marvel?

Commentary: Mark tells us that the women wondered who would roll the stone away as they came closer to the tomb. Most of us, male and

female, have found ourselves so focused on a particular purpose that we forget an important detail. Their joyful surprise turns quickly to perplexity. Jesus' body is gone. A real sense of further calamity begins to rise within them. Their anguish turns quickly to fear when angelic visitors suddenly appear in the tomb with them. But their fears, their bruised hearts, and their minds hear words they have heard before but never made any sense to them. The Son of man must be delivered into the hands of sinful men, and be crucified, and the third day rise again. A reality they could not comprehend before now frees them of their perplexity and anxiety. The good news is the greatest news. And such great news cannot be stifled but must be shared. The resurrection of Jesus is the key that unlocks the mysteries of the suffering and death of Jesus on the cross.

November 8 - Luke 24:13-32

Why didn't these two men head for Emmaus the day before?

What was their emotional state?

What were they doing as they walked?

What had changed for them in the way in which they regarded Jesus?

How had the different reports by those who had gone to the tomb impacted them?

What did Jesus do for these men as they walked together?

Is there any significance in their recognizing Jesus in the breaking of bread?

Commentary: While this lesson only covers a portion of Luke 24 the entire chapter touches us deeply. The significance of the Resurrection reveals the work of grace that is done for us in Christ's death on the cross. But this chapter also reveals how human we are in the process of comprehending the Lord and His divine love for us. Women head for the tomb to finish a task done hastily by men as a last token of their love for their master. Instead, they are given a greater task by angels to spread the good news that He is risen. Men respond with varying

degrees of curiosity, doubt, and disbelief. Cleopas and his companion are still in shock trying desperately to make sense out of their confusion. A stranger comes alongside them and points out the Scriptures that begin to knit together all the frayed edges of their faith and experience a hope burning afresh within their hearts. Then in the simplest of acts, the breaking of bread, Jesus reveals Himself to them. The interplay between heaven and earth, between divinity and humanity, between great sorrow and impossible joy helps us discern the echo of our own faith experiences as Christ, sometimes unrecognizable, walks with us through the tragedies and joys in this life.

November 15 - Luke 24:33-53

What are some of the things these men talked about on their way back to Jerusalem?

Who said, "The Lord is risen indeed, and hath appeared to Simon"?

For what possible reasons does Jesus tarry into the evening before appearing to all of them?

While we have no account of Jesus appearing to Simon first both Luke and Paul assert that He did. What are some of the reasons you come up with for that?

Is Thomas the only doubter?

What are some of the verses that Jesus likely refers to as He opened their understanding?

Commentary: We want more. Matthew, Mark, and Luke all seem too brief in their accounts of Jesus' resurrection appearances. We want more, similar to what the Gospel of John provides. Even then we want more. We want more so that we can have greater assurance as to the reality of Jesus' resurrection. And in wanting more we reveal that we are no different than some of the disciples, who even in Jesus' presence, doubted. Is wanting more just unbelief in disguise? How much more do we need? John writes in John 20:30-31 "And many other signs truly did Jesus in the presence of his disciples, which are not written in this book: But these are written, that ye might believe

that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of God; and that believing ye might have life through his name." We want more but we have been given enough in order to believe. And when we believe we are given life, His life, resurrection life. It is this life that strengthens and nurtures our belief so that we are able to receive more of His life. This is the more we must desire. So, let us believe that we might have life, resurrection life, through His name.

November 22 - Psalm 136

There are four distinct groupings in this Psalm: 1-3 & 26, 4-9, 10-22, 23-25. How would you label each group?

What is the content of another group whose label is your name?

What verse speaks most dearly to your heart?

What additional group do you want to add to this Psalm?

How long does your mercy endure?

Commentary: As we contemplate the abundance of ways God has shown His mercy to us, we should be filled with thanksgiving. We thank God for who He is, for the beauty of all He has created, and for all the ways He manifested His love and mercy on God's people. And upon us, you, and me. All these reasons should prepare us for what we have not yet received. The best is yet to come. It will continue for all eternity. Since mercy is part of God's character, we will have an eternal succession of experiences to thank Him for His mercy.

November 29 - Luke 1:1-25

What did Luke understand his purpose to be?

Who is Theophilus?

Why is it frequently in scripture that the person's first response to an angel is fear?

What is the first thing Gabriel tells Zacharias that should have turned his fear to joy?

What warning should we hear when comparing verse 6 with verse 20?

What similar circumstance in Israel's history could have been a source of confirmation to Zacharias in believing all that Gabriel told him?

How do you explain Elizabeth's behavior?

Commentary: Luke is both a scholar and historian. His literary style has all the polish associated with those of great learning. But what he is most mindful of doing is handing down in written form what was delivered to him and others orally. While he is comfortable with claiming a mastery of the subject matter he is presenting, he is not claiming any special knowledge beyond what the eyewitnesses and ministers have already faithfully delivered. His deliberate effort is to reproduce what he has received so that Theophilus and many others including you and me can be confident in what we have been taught. Part of what we are taught is the fallibility of the human family as it responds to the divine purposes that God is putting into motion. Zacharias becomes the first example for us to see. He is a priest, a righteous man who is blameless in keeping the commandments and ordinances of God. Yet he blinks in disbelief at all that the angel Gabriel tells him. This is but a foreshadowing of the absolute necessity for everyone of us to realize how desperately we are in need of a Savior. Providing a Savior is the centerpiece of God's Heart and Mind and therefore the heart of the Gospel.

Matt. 16:21-28; Mark 8:31-38; Luke 9:22-27

"But as it is written, Eye hath not seen, nor ear heard, neither have entered into the heart of man, the things which God hath prepared for them that love him." I Cor. 2:9. "INFLUENCE"

Influence is a big word and far-reaching. It is a power flowing out of our personality and shapes the character of those with whom we come in touch. This is no doubt what Jesus was alluding to when he said: "Let your light so shine before men, that they may see your good works and glorify your Father which is in Heaven."

One shows his light by chaste conversation, moral conduct, and modest appearance, which has a controlling power over the lives of those with whom we come in contact for good and tends to the glorification of the Father. Christ had a divine personality, although His activities were confined to the limited territory of Palestine, and yet His life and teaching influenced individuals, homes, society, and nations to the ends of the earth. "In Him was life; and the life was the light of man." Jesus said to His disciples; "Ye are the light of the world." For this reason has He instituted His church, composed "Of a chosen generation, a royal priesthood, an holy nation, a peculiar people, that ye should

shew forth the praises of Him who has called you out of darkness into his marvelous light"; to show others how to live, that her influence might be felt to the end of the earth. "But ye shall receive power after that the Holy Ghost is come upon you; and ye shall be witnesses unto me, both in Jerusalem and in Samaria, and unto the uttermost part of the earth."

No doubt this is what Paul had in view when he said, "But we all, with open face beholding as in a glass the glory of the Lord, are changed into the same image from glory to glory, even as by the Spirit of the Lord." The Christian is the reflector, with an open face he looks upon Christ consequently he is reflecting in his life the life of Christ, and thus he is transformed into the image of Christ – from glory to glory – or from one degree of glory to a higher degree of glory.

As he continues to look upon Christ and walk in His light he becomes purer and holier in character, and thus becomes the light of the world, as Jesus was the light when upon earth; as the influence of Christ has transformed the Christian's life into the image of Him. So, His life will influence those with whom he comes in touch to become transformed into the image of Christ.

Our influence over the lives of others will shape our future destiny; it will accompany one's personality to the final judgment, and there will either excuse or accuse the person. How important it is then that we walk in the light as He is in the light, that we may have fellowship one with another. Light has no fellowship with darkness - absolutely not. The record says that if we are to walk in the light, but if we do not, we are in darkness. We should have no fellowship with the unfruitful works of darkness. "What communion hath light with darkness?" If we walk in darkness our influence is a power for evil. If we walk in the light of the word of God, our influence has a telling effect for good. Believe me, we will be held responsible for the fruit of our doing in the final windup.

The influence of a religious organization can be a power in breaking down the sins of a nation. Sixty years ago, the temperance cause was in its

infancy, and its advocates were looked upon as fanatics. It originated in the Society of the Quakers and the Church of the Brethren, It was not enforced upon the people by political or physical power, but it was taught to be sinful even to sell grain to distilleries, let alone to drink it or traffic in the stuff, until it had taken such a hold on the people that not only the churches throughout the United States advocated the temperance cause, but nonprofessors saw the impropriety of the traffic, and the Eighteenth Amendment was voted to the Constitution. That is what the influence of a Christian people will do, although comparatively few in number. How true, "That the Kingdom of Heaven is like to a grain of mustard", which a man took and sowed in his field, which indeed is the least of all seeds, but when it is grown, it is the greatest among herbs.

The same can be said of the non-resistance doctrine which was advocated by the above named organizations, as well as by the Mennonite church, and its members had to suffer much in time of wars for refusing to take up arms against their fellow

man. It was during the World War that ministers of certain denominations declared from the pulpit that men who died on the battlefield were like Christ who died for his fellow man. But today all seem to advocate the peace principle. In fact, it has taken such a hold on the people that our nation is about to form a league with other nations to abolish war. That is what the influence of teaching will do. "Go ye therefore and teach all nations"

The evil effects of intemperance and war have been taught from every angle – the negative as well as the positive side of the question has been brought out until it has such a convincing effect on the people which brought about the present results.

There is another doctrine when the opposite of its teaching is indulged in is just as damaging in its effects, if not more so, than with intemperance. But the Church fell down on it, not because in was a wrong cause, but the passion for what it condemns is so deeply seated in human nature that even the church yielded to the clamoring for its abolition.

Consequently, she has lost

her power of "influence" in favor of non-conformity to the world in vain and fashionable dress. It is worldliness in one of its worst forms, and is so deeply seated in the hearts of men and women that they will go the full length to gratify their desires, whether by legal means or otherwise, and console themselves by thinking there is no harm in its indulgence, because ministers do not cry against it.

If the evil effects of this sin were traced to the extent that the evil effects of war and intemperance are, people would be educated in the knowledge of its sinfulness.

It is indeed a prominent phase of worldliness, and we are taught in the Bible not to love the world, neither the things that are in the world. "If any man love the world, the love of the Father is not in him. For all that is in the world, the lust of the flesh and the lust of the eyes and the pride of life, is not of the Father, but of the world." (1 John 2:15-16.)

It is the passion for fashionable dress that has taken possession of the hearts of the church people, and their influence is a power for evil instead of for good. The ministers have ceased to cry against this sin, consequently the laity feels justified, because "His watchmen are blind: they are all ignorant, they are all dumb dogs; they cannot bark." (Isa. 56:10.)

They say, "preach the positive and not the negative." But I notice in the churches where this rule is followed. the laity is not only clad in the height of fashion, but the gold ornaments and diamonds are in evidence. What a terrible influence to account for, in the day of all days. Paul preached both the positive and the negative, when he said, "In like manner also, that women adorn themselves in modest apparel, with shamefacedness and sobriety." He did not stop there, he also brought in the negative notice: "Not with broided hair, or gold, or pearls or costly array; But (which becometh women professing godliness) with good works." (1 Tim. 2:9-10.) This language being included in a solemn charge to a young bishop makes it doubly authoritative.

Must the doctrine of nonconformity be crucified on the cross of worldliness? Does it become the painful duty to be separated from a church organization in order to be separated from the world; or must conservatism be exchanged for so-called progressiveness? Which?

"Wherefore come out from among them, and be ye separate, saith the Lord, and touch not the unclean thing; and I will receive you. And will be a Father unto you, and ye shall be my sons and daughters, saith the Lord Almighty. Having, therefore these promises, dearly beloved, let us cleanse ourselves from all filthiness of the flesh and spirit, perfecting holiness in the fear of God."

DAY 259 (LATE AUGUST)

What is Day 259? There is nothing special about this being Day 259. I have not been looking forward to this day for any reason. Nor am I likely to remember this day as anything special. But Day 259 has come because there was a Day 1 and Day 1 can be any day of the year. Therefore, beginning to read through the entire Bible in a year's time can start today or any day.

While there are many reasons for reading through the Bible one reason, we can relate to is the tumultuous time in which we are living. The headlines of this year have impacted all of us to some degree. Covid-19 is a reality all of us are wrestling with. While only a few of us have contracted the disease all of us are responding in a variety of ways. Many times, those responses are based on our political views, cultural outlook, or medical perspective. Since I have used the word "political" few of us need reminding that this is an election year with all the propaganda that is typical during it. Add to this stew controversies over racial discrimination, police brutality, riots, economic ups and downs, hurricanes, wildfires in the West and it all adds up to something very untypical compared to most years. Oftentimes during great controversies, during a worldwide pandemic, during social unrest, and political change, truth is the first casualty. Indeed, it is a rare commodity to be found.

So, where can we turn to know the truth? In the midst of the tempest of our times it can feel like we are children, "...,tossed to and fro, and carried about with every wind of doctrine, by the sleight of men, and cunning craftiness, whereby they lie in wait to deceive." (Eph 4:14.) These words of Paul describe accurately the state of our culture in America. We live in an increasingly polarized society with many voices proclaiming diverse and conflicting versions of the truth.

Hopefully, some of you have noticed that I left something out in the verse quoted above. It begins, "That we henceforth be no more children..." In other words, we are not to be like children who neither have the maturity or experience to be rooted and grounded in the truth. Rather, as Paul goes on to say in verse 15, "But speaking the truth in love, may grow up into him in all things, which is the head, even Christ."

So how can we grow up so that the tempests of our time ultimate-

ly strengthen our faith and understanding? We need to be rooted in God's Word. Reading the Bible begins and ends with the simple purpose of listening for what God wants to tell us. Our need to know what God wants to tell us is not a class we take or a group of courses from which we will graduate. It is a lifetime assignment. It is as necessary for our spiritual life as food is for our physical life. This growing up into our head, Christ Jesus, means sinking our roots deeply into the Scriptures so that our distinctly Christian worldview is biblically based.

There are a variety of ways to sink our spiritual roots into the Scriptures. Reading through the Bible in a specific time frame, such as a year, helps the big picture of who God is and what He has done grow in our minds. We see God's creation come to life in the beginning. We see the end of history and the eternal life that awaits those who have received the spirit of adoption into God's family. The story of salvation history is woven into the tumultuous times experienced time and again by God's people throughout history. Our own tumult may only be a singular page in the story. But we are part of that story and therefore participants in God's salvation that we receive by faith through His Son, Jesus Christ.

Therefore, whatever reading program you may choose, and there are many to choose from, let Day 1 begin right away. It will require daily discipline. Some readings will be tedious. Our humanity can discourage us as we become lazy, easily bored, overwhelmed by the struggles of life, exceedingly busy, and so on. The Lord knows this about us. Yet so perfect is His love for us that He is constantly wooing us to fellowship with Him. His Word speaks to every condition in our hearts and lives. Learning to turn to Him each day, learning to enjoy His fellowship, learning to understand His ways, His wisdom, and His love is why we are alive. Reading His Word helps focus our hearts so that in spite of what our present experience feels like at the moment the constancy of His eternal nature upholds, comforts, and grows us into the image of His Son Jesus Christ. As you progress and persevere you will have reason to praise God, with thanksgiving, for His Word. Do not wait; just begin.
