AN OUTWARD SIGN OF AN INWARD COMMITMENT

Aperson gets into trouble when they do not have any confirmation of their commitment to Jesus Christ. Some will say very glibly that they are really trusting God for their daily life. The problem is their words are not followed up by consistent action on their part.

It is hard to commit to someone or something without thoroughly investigating it. I want to know the pluses and minuses. I want to know the good and the bad. I want to know what I am really getting into.

To say that I am a follower of Christ without looking into what it means to be a follower of Christ will not get me ahead.

Some people believe that the purpose of "faith" is to help them become successful out in the world. It would be difficult to find Scripture supporting that kind of thing. My commitment to Jesus Christ is not a negotiation with God to get what I want out of life.

On the surface, a commitment to Jesus Christ is the most confusing thing in all the world. It contradicts everything out in the world.

With Abraham in the Old Testament and the circumcision that God introduced, we have something very confusing. How can something outward like this, which makes no sense from a human

standpoint, have anything to do with a spiritual commitment to God.

I am sure Abraham did not fully understand the significance of this act of circumcision. Because Abraham was a man of faith and trusted God, he committed himself to this outward sign of a covenant with God.

Out in the business world, the world of money, before someone signs a contract, they read the entire "fine print." If we are going to commit ourselves, we need to know what we are committing ourselves to. How many times has somebody been tricked into a contract they really did not understand because they did not read the "fine print"?

I do not believe God works that way. God is not trying to trick us into some commitment that we do not know what we are doing. God does not need to work that way.

I know that on the surface, our commitment to God is very confusing. However, God never wants us to commit to him without understanding what we are committing to. He does not need that kind of pressure to get us to follow him.

The devil, on the other hand, works this way all the time. He gets people to commit to something

they have no idea what they are committing to, and when they realize what they have committed themselves to, it is usually too late.

If I am really going to commit myself to God, the first step is to get to know God. I believe the reason Abraham was able to commit to this circumcision ritual was that he knew God. And what he knew about God enabled him to take a step of faith.

As I get to know God, I come to one awesome conclusion, which is, God's covenant has permanent and eternal ramifications. This is seen through the covenant of the circumcision ritual.

I need to understand that God is not here to help me get through this world. Certainly, I can trust him when I come against some of the terrible tribulations and trials I must face. But at the core of God's dealing with me is eternity. What God is doing in my life right now is preparing me for eternity.

Men's contracts have to do with this life. And there are certain times when we can make a contract to make this life a little better. But none of the world's contracts can ever flow over into eternity.

My commitment opens the door for God to work in my life in ways I do not understand but will prepare me for eternity.

Man's contracts are vulnerable

to change, which is why we have so many lawyers doing so well in our culture today. God's covenant, however, changes not.

If I can wrap my heart around that concept, I will begin to understand how important it is to commit myself to God.

The outward sign of this inward commitment to God is summed up in one word, obedience. I cannot obey somebody I do not trust. I cannot trust somebody I do not know. I cannot know somebody until I have spent quality time with that person.

I need to check my commitment to the Lord regularly. I need to ask one simple question: What has my obedience to God cost me this week?

If my obedience has no cost factor to it, is it genuine obedience? To follow God will cost me quite a bit. The other side of the coin is just as true. Not to follow God, not to obey God will cost me more, a lot more.

I need to figure out what is the cost I am willing to bear. When I figure that out, I will be willing to obey God regardless of the cost factor.

As we "study to shew ourselves approved unto God...

May 2021 Study Questions

May 2 - Ephesians 4:25-5:7

In verses 25-32 what is the issue most common amongst them?

What is a common problem in most cultures?

When does anger become sin?

Does the phrase "Lost and Found" seem like a possible synopsis for verse 28?

How do you avoid the fleshly acts of verse 31 and replace them with the spiritual fruits of verse 32?

What sort of words or phrases come to your mind when thinking of vain and empty words?

Commentary: James 3:6a says, "And the tongue is a fire, a

world of iniquity." Much of our lesson deals directly with the use of our tongue and resisting the urge to use its fire against others. So, whether it is lying, which can be a way to steal from others, vulgarity, deceit, words said in anger with malice that intends to hurt others, and many more, the tongue can start fires that ruin relationships and divide brothers and sisters in Christ.

All of us have said things in haste without thinking that have hurt others. But with our tongues we can also "minister grace unto the hearers." On many occasions it is our responsibility to walk back from what we have said and apologize for the consequences of our words. At other times we have experienced the Spirit's power that kept us from saying what our feelings wanted to say and instead allowed the Spirit to edify our words to minimize conflict. In our day to day lives the use of our tongue is frequently the greatest test of our life in Christ Jesus.

May 9 - 2 Timothy 1:1-18

What is the interaction between the laying on of hands and the work of the Holy Spirit?

What is Timothy's gift?

How have you experienced a sound mind?

Have you discovered God's purpose for your life?

Are you ready to share in the sufferings for the gospel?

What is the form or pattern of sound words that Paul refers to?

Commentary: Many of us can call to remembrance the spiritual influence that our mothers and grandmothers have had in our lives. During one particular sleepover at "grandma's house" my cousin and I learned that the assignment for the SS class she taught was to learn the Old Testament books in order. Yet, under her tutelage and with less than an hour to prepare, we were able to memorize them.

Our spiritual lives are often developed by the purposeful actions

and modeling done by our mothers and grandmothers. But perhaps, in Timothy's case, he received an additional benefit from these women who had played such an important role in his spiritual development. Their love, care, and concern for him did not bind him to themselves. Timothy spent a lot of time with Paul in places far distant from his earliest home. In spending time with Paul there was also likely to be suffering. Perhaps as Timothy read Paul's letter his mother may have read it too. Paul's words, "but be thou partaker of the afflictions of the gospel" would surely have pierced her heart. Yet, the genuineness of her faith would also have encouraged Timothy to go to Paul rather than keeping him safe at home. Sometimes it takes as much faith to send someone as it does for someone to go.

May 16 - Ephesians 5:8-24

Relationally, what are some of the differences between one who is light and one who is darkness?

How do we find out what is acceptable to the Lord?

Who first do you need to tell or warn about the unfruitful works of darkness?

What does it mean to walk circumspectly?

What is the consequence of walking foolishly?

As Paul speaks of worship in verses 17-21 what aspect do you want to grow in?

Commentary: Stone walls are not transparent. They block out the light. But if a window is installed light can penetrate the dark interior. Our lives in Christ are windows through which the light of Christ can shine. His light reveals the glory of God. A closer inspection may reveal dust, water spots, smudges from oily fingers, and other imperfections. At times we do not want others to see our imperfections. So, we close the curtains or pull down the blinds. Sin always seeks the darkness and does not

want to be exposed by the light. We may fool others who are kept in the dark at least for a time. We do not ever fool the light. God blesses us by exposing the darkness of sin. At the same time, He reveals a Redeemer who cleanses all those places where sin dulls and blurs the light. That cleansing involves confessing our sin to God and sometimes to others as well. But this is part of being a window and the joy of seeing the light of Christ shine through others who have chosen transparency rather than darkness.

May 23 - Ephesians 5:25-6:9*(start w/vs22)

How does a wife submitting to her husband impact his leadership in the marriage?

How does a husband's love for his wife impact her willingness to submit?

What is the great mystery?

What provokes a child to wrath?

How is training a child different from disciplining?

How do you apply verses 6:1-9 to your business or place of employment?

Commentary: For those of us who are married no other human relationship defines who we are so completely. Every choice, every decision is weighed upon the basis of how the choice or decision impacts both. Yes, there are times of thoughtlessness that typically comes back to haunt us for not considering the impact to both. There are sinful choices we make that typically are based on our own self-satisfaction. Regardless, every choice and decision impacts both husband and wife. As we learn to love and lead, to submit and respect, a oneness in our identity, a oneness in our flesh binds us together in a powerful union. It is these human phenomena occurring on a human plane that allows us to perceive the spiritual relationship of Christ and

the church. In Christ, our identities are no longer forged by our selfish, sinful ambitions but are formed by the sacrificial love of our Savior. As Lord of our lives His great love for us calls forth the greatness of His life in us as we submit ourselves to Him.

May 30 - Ephesians 6:10-24

How do you know if you are strong in the Lord?

Why does Paul say "whole armor" instead of just armor?

Who are we/you fighting?

What attitude is suggested by Paul's use of the word stand or standing?

What armor have you neglected putting on?

If you were imprisoned (in chains) what would you ask others to pray for you?

Commentary: Most of us do not aspire to be a soldier. There are multiple contradictions between being a soldier and being a disciple of Jesus, such as learning how to kill the enemy. But Paul takes the typical elements that a soldier uses in any battle and ascribes to them a spiritual counterpart. The result is that there is a soldier like mentality that we must develop to become effective disciples of Christ. We must develop a mastery of the weapons, offensive and defensive, to defeat our enemies. We must test our skills daily so that our responses to Satan's devious and cunning plans are quickly countered. Our commitment and dedication to the Lord requires all our strength. As soldiers of Christ, we realize that any strength we possess to overcome our adversaries does not come from us but from the Lord. So, let us dedicate ourselves to being strong in the Lord and in the power of His might.

THE MAN WHO WOULDN'T FORGIVE

Matt. 18:21-35

One time Jesus talked about a king who had many servants. The servants worked for the king and took care of his property and his business. This king loaned money to some of his servants and at certain times would take an account of how much was owed to him. One servant was brought to him which owed the king ten thousand talents or about fifteen million dollars. How one servant could get in debt to the king for that much. I do not know, but he had because Jesus said so. I suppose he was an overseer of the king's business and it would have been easy for him to borrow money. He may have gambled, hoping for a big return which never came.

As the servant had nothing to

pay the debt, the king commanded him and his wife and children to be sold and payment to be made. We do not know what it would be like to be sold into slavery. People who owed money and could not pay were put up for auction and men would bid on them just like animals are sold today. They would then become slaves for life to the one who paid the highest price. Often the wife and children would be sold to different buyers and they might never see one another again. Aren't you glad that you live in a country that does not allow anyone to be a slave?

The servant fell before the king and begged for mercy and said, "Lord have patience with me, and I will pay thee all." The king knew the

servant would never be able to pay the debt and how terrible it would be for the man and his family to be sold, so he had compassion on him and let him go and forgave him the debt. I think that king was a good man, don't you?

The rest of the story is sad. This same servant who had been forgiven so much, went out and found one of his fellow servants who owed him a hundred pence. He laid hands on him, grabbed him by the throat and said, "Pay me what you owe." Then the fellow servant fell at his feet and said, "Have patience with me and I will pay you all." But the man would not but went and cast him into prison till he should pay the debt. How he expected a man in prison to pay him, I will never know!

The man who was put in prison had friends. It is always good to have friends who will help in a time of need. These friends were also servants of the king and told him what had happened. The king

immediately sent for the servant to whom he had forgiven so much and said to him, "O, thou wicked servant, I forgave thee all that debt because you desired mercy of me: shouldn't you also have had compassion on your fellow servant, even as I had on you?" We do not read that the unmerciful servant had one word to say. Then the king became angry and delivered him to the jailers till he should pay all that was due him.

The lesson we should learn is that Jesus said, "So likewise shall my heavenly Father do also unto you, if you from your hearts forgive not every one his brother their trespasses." Peter said to Jesus, "Lord, how often shall my brother sin against me, and I forgive him? till seven times?" Jesus said, "I say not unto thee, until seven times; but until seventy times seven.

REPENTANCE

Repentance from a Biblical point of view means a Godly sorrow for sin.

Repentance as Webster defines it, is a change of mind, or a

conversion from sin to God. Again, let us hear the Apostle Paul define it over in 2 Cor. 7. Godly sorrow worketh repentance to salvation.

John the Baptist, the

forerunner of Christ, preached repentance when out in the wilderness preaching preparatory to the coming of the Lord. That seems to be the tenor of his subject, repentance. There are three prerequisites in our Christian activities, faith, repentance, and baptism.

Man is born clean and spotless, but day by day, year by year, as he comes to the age of accountability, or in other words, when he knows right from wrong, then we are responsible. We hear James 4:17 speaking on the subject. "Therefore, to him that knoweth to do good, and doeth it not, to him it is a sin." Hence repentance.

So, we see here repentance ought to claim our earnest and prayerful attention.

We meet up with a twofold sin, that of commission and of omission. "For all have sinned, and come short of the glory of God." (Rom. 3:23.) It seems quite evident by this citation we were all sinners.

Again, when Peter and John were going up to the temple they came in contact with the people. They were amazed at the apostles because of the lame man who was healed. Peter now defends his convictions. (Acts 3:19.) "Repent

ye, therefore, and be converted, that your sins may be blotted out, when the times of refreshing shall come from the presence of the Lord." It is obvious we sin and are sinners.

Saint John the Revelator gives us a list of sins which the world falls under. (Rev. 21:8.) "But the fearful, and unbelieving, and the abominable, and murderers, and whoremongers, and sorcerers, and idolators, and all liars, shall have their part in the lake which burnt with fire and brimstone: which is the second death." Provided we fail to heed to God and do his commandments. God does not look on sin with any degree of approval. If we disbelieve any one command, disregard, ignore it, we stand just as quilty as if we came under all these as cited above.

In the apostolic age in the spreading of the Gospel, we note the apostles were preaching repentance. We read in the acts of the apostles (Acts 17) when the Apostle Paul arrived in Athens, he discovered some disorders, the whole city was given over to idolatry. (Acts 17:23.) "For as I passed by, and beheld your devotions, I found an altar with this inscription, TO THE UNKNOWN GOD. Whom therefore ye

ignorantly worship, him declare I unto you." The apostle goes on to reason with them, and in the 30th verse of the same chapter, "And the times of this ignorance God winked at; but now commandeth all men everywhere to repent." Dear Brethren, in the sacred ministry my beloved colaborers, as we go here and there administering in holy and sacred things may the cause be laid on our hearts that we will preach repentance.

I am aware of the fact that the subject is a very unpopular one. We see a lot of conversion, so to speak when a revival is on, when the feelings are aroused by some fluent speaker who handles the Word with kid gloves, whose tongue is silvered over, the message is sugar-coated which makes it seem very plausible not much to do only just believe, one who possesses an oratory which gives much levity on occasions, which is altogether out of order in God's house.

The people are swept off their feet into the church by the dozen, regardless of repentance, and then when the evangelist is gone things return to normal, the part of them show no indication they ever repented. This has come under the writer's observation

Brethren and Sisters, I believe in a repentance that completely changes a man from head to foot, so that the things we once loved we now hate, and the things we once hated we now love. I do not mean to infer that we should have that disposition of hate. God forbid.

We should delight in doing God's will in the keeping of His commandments.

Now, in concluding, let me say: In the final consummation. when we shall stand before God in judgment the ones who have repented of all their ungodly deeds and their ungodly speeches and proven themselves by the deportment with reference to repentance, the King is going to say to them on His right hand, "Come, ye blessed of my Father, inherit the kingdom prepared for you from the foundation of the world." (Matt. 23:34.) But to those who have not repented will be the opposite. "Then shall he answer them, Verily I say unto you, inasmuch as ye did it not unto one of the least of these, ye did it not to me. And these shall go away unto everlasting punishment. But the righteous into life eternal." Amen.

As members of the Bible Study Board our hope in writing monthly articles related to the Adult Sunday School Lessons is that we all see afresh different points of connection that reveal the Word made flesh.

Eph. 6:10

"Finally, my brethren, be strong in the Lord, and in the power of his might."

There may be some tendency to move quickly past this verse so we can learn about the whole armor of God that we are to put on. There is a warrior mentality that we should aspire to in putting on and using the whole armor of God. Each piece provides either protection or supremacy in the battle. But if we hurry past this verse we may discover, all to quickly, how easily we tire in carrying around so much armor. As a result, we begin to lav aside the heavier armor like the shield or the breast plate. Perhaps lesser items in our own mind, like footwear, are given little thought. Our attention to mastering our spiritual weapons begins to wander.

We are less and less prepared for battle while presuming we are strong enough to fight. Depending on our own strength can only lead to disaster and defeat.

The whole armor of God has been crafted by God. It is supernatural in its design and use. To use it we must have supernatural strength. That strength can only come from the Lord. Only His strength can wield the weapons that bring about victory. Cultivating His strength in us is the key to successfully using the whole armor of God. This involves recognizing our weaknesses. We all have tendencies that can betray us in a moment of weakness. As we humble ourselves before Him and confess our weaknesses our faith is challenged to depend on the power of His might.

Paul first introduces us to His mighty power in chapter one.

"And what is the exceeding greatness of his power to usward who believe, according to the working of his mighty power, Which he wrought in Christ, when he raised him from the dead," (Eph. 1:19-20a) God desires to share His great power with us. It becomes available to us through faith in Him. As we learn to trust in His mighty power, we gain confidence in the Lord's ability to overcome all obstacles we face in this life. We seek His power that overcomes death and the grave. It is the same power that raised Jesus from the dead. Experiencing His strength as we use His armor creates a quiet confidence that defies the power of death and defeat. The more we depend on His strength the stronger we become in the Lord.

The resurrection of Christ and the resulting exaltation and glorification of Christ is the prime example of God's mighty power. It seated Jesus at His right hand and exalted Him high above all other powers. It made the name of Jesus greater than any other name of any age. It made Jesus the head of the church. (Ephesians 1:20b-23) Jesus is Lord of lords and King of kings. In truth it has always been the case but now it has been revealed as the gospel has been proclaimed.

The demonstration of the truth of this revelation and its power is taking place in our experience as the church. We are more than mere proclaimers. We demonstrate truth in the living out of our daily lives, both in our worship and our fellowship with one another.
