PLAIN TALK

James 3:1-12

Do you control your tongue, or does it control you?

The Bible talks a lot about the tongue and the importance of controlling it. Proverbs and the Psalms are full of good instruction for us. We can find verses scattered throughout scripture with wisdom about the tongue and the difference between fools and the wise. The way we use our tongue is important to God, and here in James 3 we find the most comprehensive instruction about it. Here James breaks it down into four subjects or headings.

#1. The responsibility of using our tongue. Verse 1

Verse 1 says that we should be cautious of teaching. Teaching in a right and true manner is good, but teachers are held to a higher standard than those that don't teach. They have a greater opportunity, a greater responsibility and therefore greater accountability. Good, God based teaching is priceless. When a person opens his mouth and teaches, he has opened himself up to a special kind of judgement by others. Teachers are under a greater responsibility to do exactly as they teach!!!

James says to teach only because we want the influence and authority that comes with it is something we should avoid. Don't let this be a deterrent from teaching if you have the right motives, but if you are in it only for the power and status, please refrain from it.

#2. The tremendous power of the tongue. Verses 2-5

Verse 2. We all stumble or offend in many areas of life; however, the tongue is the most difficult member of the body to control and if a person can control his tongue, he is also able

to control his whole body. One reason that the tongue is so hard to control, is that we use it more than any other member of our body. We speak on average 16-20,000 words per day so the chances of saying something we shouldn't are greatly increased in comparison to our other activities.

James moves on to making a comparison of large objects that are controlled by small objects. A horse and a bit, a ship and a rudder. In comparison, both of these "controllers" are relatively small and insignificant to the mass of the horse or the ship, but they are used to control the direction of both. A huge fire that burns for days or weeks, lots of times was started with just a careless spark or ember. The same is true of our tongue.

Luke 6:45, "A good man out of the good treasure of his heart bringeth forth that which is good; and an evil man out of the evil treasure of his heart bringeth forth that which is evil: for of the abundance of the heart his mouth speaketh." The way we speak is an indication of our heart condition. Our tongue is a small member but has the power to speak lies, gossip, railings, accusations, and wreak havoc wherever it goes.

On the contrary, our tongue

also could speak life, blessing, and encouragement. The statistic is this; It takes ten positive compliments or blessing said to erase one negative word! Let us be a people of blessing speakers.

#3. The seriousness of careless talk. Verses 6-8

Here James is describing the tongue of an undisciplined person. The human tongue by nature, acts like an out-of-control fire, leaving a path of destruction and desolation. A 'world of iniquity" speaks to the vastness of evil an unregenerated tongue has the potential to produce. A tongue left unchecked, will defile the whole body and put the soul in jeopardy of hell.

James mentions all the creatures of creation. Man has been and is taming them and controlling them, but the tongue cannot be tamed by any man. It is full of deadly poison. It is shut up behind a row of teeth and sealed lips, but it still manages to get out and stir up strife. Unkind, untrue, or other hurtful words, put husband and wives, employee and employers, parents and children and family members at odds with each other.

It has been said that a poisonous drug does not need to be taken in large doses to be effective. A drop or two on a continual basis usually does the trick. Same for the tongue. A few ill words here or there will spread poison and can do more damage than a long speech.

The good news in this passage is that James does not say that the tongue cannot be tamed. He says no man can do it. God can and will tame our tongue if we will ask Him and allow Him to work in our lives. Psalm 141:3, "Set a watch, O Lord, before my mouth; keep the door of my lips." Psalm 120:2, "Deliver my soul, O Lord, from lying lips, and from a deceitful tongue." We need to be alert, crucify the old man in us and let the Lord have His way in our lives, specifically in our words.

#4. The importance of consistent speech. Verses 9-12

James refers to several things in nature that we would think absolutely strange if they produced several different things instead of just the one thing, that the Lord created them to do. A well or spring produces either good or bad water, not some of each depending on how it "feels" that day. A fig tree, grapevine, olive tree, they all produce after their kind. We would never expect something different hanging on their branches. James argues that the same amount of ridiculousness is found in a

tongue speaking both blessing and cursing. We praise God, then turn and curse man who was made in God's image.

The word curse here I believe includes using course or foul language, but it goes beyond that to wishing bad or disaster on a person. Psalm 35:27-28, "Let them shout for joy, and be glad, that favour my righteous cause: yea, let them say continually, Let the Lord be magnified, which hath pleasure in the prosperity of his servant." God commands and expects us to praise Him, and we should, but to curse the ones created in God's image would be inconsistent.

We should have love, concern, and blessing toward our fellow human beings. With God's help we can turn this unruly evil, this out-of-control, uncontrollable fire. this world of iniquity this deadly poison into something that speaks blessing, peace, grace, and truth. God wants it therefore we should want it. God's ways are right. Psalm 15: "Lord, who shall sojourn in thy tabernacle? Who shall dwell in thy holy hill? He that walketh uprightly, and worketh righteousness, and speaketh the truth in his heart. He that backbiteth not with his tongue, nor doeth evil to his neighbour, nor taketh up a reproach against his neighbour. In whose eyes a

vile person is condemned; but he honoureth them that fear the Lord. He that sweareth to his own hurt, and changeth not. He that putteth not out his money for usury, nor taketh reward against the innocent. He that doeth these things shall never be moved."

If we want to see God and dwell with Him, we must die to self, and in doing so we willingly remove our spirit and ask God to put a piece of His Spirit inside us and rule our thoughts and our tongue. Our words are important enough to God that Malachi 3:16 tells us He is writing a book that contains our words. "Then they that feared the Lord spake often one to another: and the Lord harkened, and heard it, and a book of remembrance was written before him for them that feared the Lord, and that thought upon his name."

Revelation 20:12, "And I saw the dead, small and great, stand before God; and the books were opened: and another book was opened, which is the book of life: and the dead were judged out of those things which were written in the books, according to their works."

I believe that our works are more visible than our words but everything we do and speak is important. If we are judged by those things, I would say they are important to God. Transforming the tongue takes supernatural strength. Strength that only is available through God and His redemptive work. It should be the goal of all believers to carefully guard the tongue and lips. Proverbs 6:16-19, "These six things doth the Lord hate: yea, seven are an abomination unto him: A proud look, a lying tongue. and hands that shed innocent blood. An heart that deviseth wicked imaginations, feet that be swift in running to mischief, A false witness that speaketh lies, and he that soweth discord among brethren "

Do any of you think these things are equal sins? To God they are an abomination – (Definition: - a thing that causes disgust or hatred). Three out of the seven abominations mentioned, involve the tongue. I would say that the way our tongue acts is important to God.

Verse 2 says, "If any man offend not in word, the same is a perfect man, and able also to bridle the whole body." James 1:26-27, "If any man among you seem to be religious, and bridleth not his tongue, but deceiveth his own heart, this man's religion is vain. Pure religion and undefiled before

God and the Father is this, To visit the fatherless and widows in their affliction, and to keep himself unspotted from the world." Pure talk is not commonplace in this

world. Pure clean conversation sets us apart and is a witness to the world. With God's help we can become builders and not ones that cut and tear down.

There is quite a big difference in talking about God and talking with God.

This applies, of course, to prayer. Everybody prays when they are in trouble. My thought is, who are they praying to? And do they ever get any answer to their prayers.

All this boils down to one crucial thing: a personal and intimate relationship with God. This is not religion. You can have religion without any fellowship or relationship with God. With religion, all you must do is simply obey the

rules and do the best you can.

Many people talk about God but have not really experienced God's awesome presence in their daily life. God has made no impact on their personal life.

To delight in the presence of God, several things must be in order. The first important aspect is that our relationship with God must be on God's terms and not ours. God is not coming into our world; rather, God wants to bring us into His world.

In our world, we resume the status of Lord, so we can snap our fingers and get God to do whatever we want Him to do at the time. That is not how God works.

Another important aspect is that my relationship with God must not be based upon convenience for me. It is not me making room for God, but rather surrendering my whole life to God and allowing Him to be the God He wants to be in my life.

In the Old Testament, I think of Moses along this line. For Moses to meet with God, he had to meet with Him on God's terms. God did not come down the mountain; rather, Moses went up the mountain and encountered God.

I rather think that was inconvenient for Moses. How long was he up there away from the rest of the Israelites? Moses spent forty days and forty nights on that mountain to encounter God on God's terms.

Amid all this, we need to focus on a certain question. That is, how do we today set ourselves apart to meet with God?

God has not called us to go up a mountain for forty hays and forty nights. That's not part of our relationship with God. The key element here is what is necessary for me to separate myself from the world to spend personal time alone with God?

The key to Moses going up that mountain is simply obedience. God called, and Moses answered.

The key to our intimate fellowship with God is the same, obedience. What is God calling me to do? How is God speaking to me today.

I'm not sure there's a cookiecutter answer to this. I think this is something each Christian needs to wrestle with continuously. As I read my scriptures and have my quiet time with the Lord each day, I need to be listening for his voice. What is God saying to me today, and how does that impact my life today?

If I'm just reading my Bible each day to read my Bible, I might as well not even read my Bible. If

I have not really encountered the Living Word in reading my Bible, I am doing something wrong, and I need to correct it.

Between the Word of God and the Holy Spirit, I have intimate access to God. Am I using it? Am I taking advantage of the access I have to God?

If I am going to delight in the presence of God, I need to make that a daily priority.

September 2021 Study Questions

September 5 - Revelation 11:11-12:6

Objectively, what is the ultimate contrast in power between God and Satan?

How does mankind respond to God's power manifested in the raising of the two witnesses?

When did the kingdoms of this world become the kingdoms of Christ?

Could the ark of the covenant normally be seen in the earthly temple?

Who is the woman?

Who is the child?

Commentary: In making sense of Revelation, it is best to start with what is most easily understood. As mentioned previously the two witnesses have similarities to Moses and Elijah in terms of the miracles they perform. They also speak truth to power while facing great opposition. Their deaths set off worldwide celebrations and it appears that their bodies can be seen by everyone. Now that is not difficult for us to imagine in our modern-day setting. Events from all over the world are part of our daily news. But no one from the first century could possibly imagine what we

take for granted now. If the Lord tarries another thousand years, there may well be things described in Revelation that will make sense then, but we are clueless now. So, to better understand what we can, it is more important to connect what we read with what we already know in the Bible. As we apply that preference to the first six verses of chapter 12, we can ask ourselves some simple questions. Who is the dragon? It is easy to identify the dragon as Satan, since just a few verses later he is identified as the dragon. His tail sweeping one third of the stars from heaven may refer to the fallen angels that joined him in his revolt against the Lord. Next, who is the child about to be born? It seems reasonable to begin with identifying the child as Jesus. Satan attempted to destroy (devour) Jesus even from His birth. The crucifixion would appear to have been his greatest triumph. But God "caught Him (Jesus) up to heaven" (the resurrection and ascension) and seated Him at His right hand. So, who is the woman? Thinking theologically rather than biologically one answer can be the church. Wait a minute. Jesus gave birth to the church not the other way around. This is true but we cannot ignore all those who were faithful to God prior to Christ's coming. Hebrews 11 refers to the cloud of witnesses that surround us. Did they not have saving faith in a Messiah who would come? Are they not an example to us because of their faithfulness? Are they not the forerunner of the church before the advent of Christ in human history? While the church is rooted in Jesus Christ, we are not separated from those who came before Him. The woman represents all who long for the Messiah both before and after His incarnation. So, in a few sentences John has given us a word picture that captures the essence of the gospel story. Finally, the woman's guick retreat into the wilderness should be a reminder to us that, "For here have we no continuing city, but we seek one to come." Heb. 13:1

September 12 - Revelation 12:7-17

In verse 9 what does the phrase "that old serpent" suggest?

Is the war in heaven future or past?

How is Satan's defeat in heaven reflected in the Lord's Prayer?

In verse 11 how do you connect the three phrases in your heart and mind?

What is the dragon mimicking by the flood of water coming out of his mouth?

What does the earth's help in protecting the woman tell us about the power of Satan?

Commentary: Are you fighting the battle? Satan has declared war on you because you have aligned yourself with the church that continues to declare Satan's defeat by the blood of the lamb. How do you know if you are fighting in this war? It is by the testimony you give to the One who has defeated Satan. How committed are you to fighting in this battle? Your commitment grows in direct relationship with how precious His life is to you. As you become rooted and grounded in His love, losing your life for Him is a fitting expression of how precious He is to you. Death does not separate you from Him. You are deeply aware that it is His glory and strength that supplies all that is lacking in your own heart. Martyrdom is not a goal to achieve. It is merely a path to be trod by some into everlasting fellowship with the One who did not consider His life too great a price to pay for yours.

September 19 – Revelation 13:1-18

What is the relationship between the dragon, the beast, and the second beast?

Why does the beast have a mortally looking wound to one of his heads that has healed?

How was he wounded?

In verse 7 what does it mean that the beast will overcome the saints? (Rev. 11:7)

Why will some not worship the beast?

What happens to those who will not worship the beast?

About what are the saints to be patient and exercise faith?

What does a dragon speak like?

Commentary: This chapter is likely to have been commented upon

as often as any in modern times. Usually, the commentary is rife with speculation as to the time of these events and certain persons who might fit the profile of various antagonists described in this chapter. All such attempts have ultimately been tossed into the trash can of history as no longer relevant to the current speculation. What strikes me most is Satan's mimicry of God's holiness which results in every possible way of being anti-god. The main characters of this chapter are the dragon (Satan), the beast with seven heads, and the 2nd beast who bears some resemblance to a lamb but talks like a dragon. Collectively, they are the unholy Trinity. The first beast with seven heads experienced a mortal wound to one of its heads by a sword but the wound has been healed. It is an imitation of Christ's wounds on Calvary and His resurrection that is eternally more important than mere healing. Like most imitations Satan's attempt comes infinitely short in comparison to the living God. Like a sideshow that is meant to lure and grab our attention by what we see, deception is Satan's game. Once caught by his deception the threat of death coerces the masses to worship the image of the beast while war is declared upon Christians. The world sinks deeper into darkness. For the saints who have evaded death their faith comforts them to wait patiently for the One who has written their names in the Lamb's Book of Life.

September 26 - Revelation 14:1-13

What is commonly referred to as Mt. Zion?

What specific name is written on the foreheads of the one hundred forty-four thousand?

For what practical purpose are they virgins?

Why does John mention that no deceit was found in their mouth?

What does the message of the first angel tell us about God?

What cities, then and now, best fit the name Babylon?

Commentary: The interplay between heaven and earth continues to escalate. One hundred and forty-four thousand men redeemed from the earth have joined Jesus on Mt. Zion and are involved in singing a new song for those gathered around the throne. Whether they are in their old or new

bodies is not clear. Three angels are delivering three different messages to those on the earth. The first angel is preaching the Good News to every nation, tribe, people, and tongue and the third angel is preaching the Bad News to those who continue to worship the beast and have his mark tattooed on their foreheads. The second angel introduces a new antagonist, identified as Babylon, which is falling apart under the weight of its own sin. Babylon was the center of earthly power centuries before but no longer exists at the time of John's writing. Rome fits the description of John's day of which we will soon be learning more. From our present perspective there are other cities that now fit the description. Meanwhile The Lamb of God is surveying the city He once shed tears over. Very soon He will come riding upon a white horse judging a world that has consistently rejected Him. What we don't want to miss in all this flurry of activity is that God's mercy is still available to a world that unknowingly is on its deathbed breathing its lost few breaths

Jesus loved Martha but He wanted to show her and Mary, and us too, that being interested in His teaching was far more important than preparing or serving food or doing anything else.

The good part that Mary had chosen was for everybody. We can all listen to Jesus. We can't see Him as He was when Martha and Mary were alive, but we can read His Word and do what He says. We, too, can choose that good part that will not be taken away. Jesus said, "Heaven and earth shall pass away but my words shall not pass away."

FOUR EXCEPTS

J. F. Britton

In that Great Sermon on the Mount (Matt. 5:20) Jesus said unto his disciples, in the presence of a vast multitude of people, "EXCEPT your righteousness shall exceed the righteousness of the Scribes and Pharisees, ye shall in NO CASE enter into the kingdom of Heaven."

Jesus had been discoursing about the nine indispensable requisites, and also some other principles which constitute the foundation of the Christian Church. He then exalted the Character and Mission of the Church, through the administration of the Holy Spirit. In verse 20, he sets up

an irreproachable standard of spirituality by saying, "Except your righteousness shall exceed the righteousness of the Scribes and Pharisees, ye shall in no case enter into the kingdom of Heaven."

Thus, we see that Jesus set the standard of Spiritual Righteousness on a high plain where superiority and excellency dwell, and free from the defilements of carnality. Hence. it stands to reason that it is not enough, for God's people to measure up to the "World's Great System of Righteousness", for if they do not surpass this, then it follows that they are still in the "beggarly elements" of the world. Therefore, Jesus said, "except" which signifies, "unless" "your righteousness shall EXCEED the righteousness of the Scribes and Pharisees, ye shall in NO CASE enter into the kingdom of Heaven."

In Matthew 18:1-3, we read, that the disciples came to Jesus with the question: "Who is the greatest in the kingdom of Heaven? And Jesus called a little child unto him and set him in the midst of them and said, Verily I say unto you, EXCEPT ye be converted, and become as little children, ye shall NOT enter into the kingdom of heaven." It follows then that conversion must be through; not

only must the heart be turned to God in general and from earthly to heavenly things, but in particular, except ye be converted from that carnal ambition which still rankles within you, into that freedom from all such feelings which ye see in this child, ye have neither part nor lot in the kingdom at all; and he who in this feature has most of the child, is highest there. Whosoever. therefore, shall "humble himself as this little child, the same is greatest in the kingdom of Heaven." For he that is willing to humble himself, and make an unconditional surrender to God, and cry from the depth of his heart, Lord, "make me, what thou would have me be", "shall be exalted "

It should be noted that Jesus expressed those two "Excepts" to the disciples, who had responded to the call of Jesus, and had enlisted in His service, but who had not been quickened and endued by the Holy Ghost, hence had not yet had the vision of the beauty of Holiness in the kingdom of righteousness. No wonder Jesus said to Peter, "When thou art converted, strengthen thy brethren."

In Luke 13:1-5, we read, "There were present at that season some that told him of the Galilaeans, whose blood Pilate

had mingled with their sacrifices, and Jesus, answering said unto them, suppose ye that these Galilaeans were sinners above all the Galilaeans, because they suffered such things? I tell you Nay: but EXCEPT ye REPENT, ye shall all likewise perish. Or those eighteen, upon whom the tower in Siloam fell, and slew them, think ve that they were sinners above all man that dwelt in Jerusalem? I tell vou. Nav: but except ve repent, ve shall all likewise perish." This third "Except" has under consideration, a Spiritual Reformation, which comes through Repentance, deep contrition and sorrow for sin, and leads to a new life, converted by the Holy Spirit of God. Therefore, repentance is applicable and imperative to all classes, "for all have sinned, and come short of the glory of God." (Rom. 3:23.)

Hence it is logical and stands to reason, that every man, irrespective of who he may be, who has gone counter to God's will, and is living out of union with Christ, must repent, and come back to the fellowship of Christ, to get into the kingdom of Heaven.

John 3:1-5 presents a case where a very noted man, who was a ruler of the Jews, and a member of the Sanhedrin, came to Jesus, with a wonderful recognition of the

Divinity of Christ, and his power and work. But Jesus replied in very positive and humiliating terms, "Verily, verily, I say unto thee EXCEPT a man BE BORN of WATER and of the Spirit, he cannot enter into the kingdom of God." No doubt Nicodemus had the idea that Jesus was going to inaugurate and launch some new reform in civic righteousness and economies, for world betterment. but the "Great Teacher". "who spake as never man did", disappointed and discomfited his ideas altogether, Nicodemus tried to argue matters with the Great Teacher, but it was no use. Jesus gave that great scholar to understand that his kingdom, was a spiritual kingdom of righteousness, and was populated with spiritual citizens, who had been BORN into his Kingdom through faith, that worketh by love, and repentance that turns from a life of sin unto God and is baptized into the Kingdom of Christ.

These four "Excepts" as presented by Jesus Christ; will determine every man's future destination. No wonder Peter wrote, "If the righteous scarcely be saved, where shall the ungodly and the sinner appear?" "Moses truly said unto the fathers, a prophet shall the Lord your God

raise up unto you of your brethren, like unto me; him shall ye hear in all things whatsoever he shall say unto you. And it shall come to pass that every soul, which will not hear that prophet, shall be destroyed from among the people." (Acts 3:22-23.)

Lord, breathe upon thy people,

and quicken their souls, that they make their "calling and election sure; for if ye do these things, ye shall never fall." (II Pet. 1:10) Amen.

CONNECTIONS

As members of the Bible Study Board our hope in writing monthly articles related to the Adult Sunday School Lessons is that we all see afresh different points of connection that reveal the Word made flesh.

Rev. 12:11 "And they overcame him by the blood of the Lamb, and by the word of their testimony; and they loved not their lives unto the death."

This verse comes just after a war has been fought in heaven. The result of the war is that Satan has been cast out of heaven along with his angels who fought with him. That's the good news. The bad news comes in verse 12. Satan has been cast down to the earth. Woe for us because he is full of wrath. So how can we, mere mortals, contend against supernatural beings whose goal, it seems, is to turn us into the worst human beings we can be?

Anytime there is a great battle whether it is military, or athletic, or business, or a great many other possible examples it is always good to review the results. What made it possible for us to win or what mistakes did we make that led to our defeat. Verse 11 above is the synopsis of how Michael and his angels defeated Satan and his angels. Does this verse offer us mere mortals any hope of overcoming the power of Satan and his army of demonic forces?

"And they overcame him by the blood of the Lamb." One of Satan's great weapons is the power of sin. We've all experienced it. Something we shouldn't have said or done, begins to overwhelm our desires. Lust fills our waking thoughts, and we tire of fighting what feels like a losing bat-

tle. We surrender and almost immediately we are swallowed up by guilt. We have sinned and we are a sinner. Without divine intervention we are lost. But divine intervention is what is promised in this first stanza. We are able by the power of Christ's blood to overcome sin. His blood cleanses our hearts of guilt. We are forgiven. Satan's condemnation no longer has any power over our spiritual lives. Instead, we exercise our faith in Christ accessing His grace which nourishes our hearts to withstand the temptations Satan will put before us.

"And by the word of their testimony." What is your or my testimony of which we can speak? Everything we say regarding God and His Son, Jesus, must originate with the teaching of the Scripture. It is the plum line for our understanding. The New Testament is the final authority of all doctrine and faith and is superior to the Old Testament as the New Covenant is superior to the Old Covenant. But more than these cold words are needed. Our testimony must include the work of the Holy Spirit in each of our lives. In other words, the testimony we give is also about God's dealings in our lives' experience. I have a relationship with the creator of the universe who knows me and loves me. I have experiences with Him that are deeply personal and intimate. His word speaks truth so that I can understand His mind and His Spirit comforts my heart throughout all the trials and tribulations that are a part of the human experience. The result is that I have much testimony that I can share about the glory of God.

"And they loved not their lives unto the death." We have little experience with the depths of these words. We do not experience persecution that threatens our lives. However, there are places in this world where believers must wrestle with the possibility of persecution and death each day. The reality of that experience conjures up all kinds of mournful scenes in our minds. Yet, I suspect that for many who live under such duress their response to us is to speak of the unsearchable riches of Christ. So many martyrs have marched to their death singing the praises of God. Death is not the end. Phil. 1:21, "For to me to live is Christ, and to die is gain."

I believe the apostle Paul would say to us today what he said to the Ephesian church then. Eph. 3:13, "Therefore I ask that you do not lose heart at my tribulations for you, which is your glory." What is glorious about Paul's tribulations or persecution is in various parts of the worldwide church? It is the power of God that refines and enriches the testimony of those who suffer and reveals more clearly the glory of God.

He is all sufficient for every need. Satan's hold on us is oftentimes the fear of suffering and death. But when God's sufficiency is greater than those fears then Satan is disarmed of one of his most potent weapons. May we live our lives by faith in Christ so that the threats of suffering and death are but steps to eternal gain and the glories of life with Christ Jesus.
