Job 1 – (Take time to read this scripture). This article is about a man who it says sinned not.

Most of us at some point in our lives, think we can relate with Job. The 22nd verse would not be attached to my life story. We have had some difficult trials this year; financially, loss of a beloved friend, an accident and sickness.

So. I want to take a moment and share with you some of my thoughts. There can be many things swirling around in our minds from everyday life. There may not be enough hours in the day to accomplish the necessities for our families and households. Keeping the house clean, laundry done, animals fed, outside chores done, vehicles serviced/repaired/ cleaned, yard mowed, bills paid; besides children's activities, grocery shopping, planning/preparing meals, aches/pains, doctors' visits, health concerns, and then the

house A/C goes out and the ice maker quits working on the hottest day of the summer. This list can be longer than mentioned (family tragedy, betrayal from a friend, and so forth) and we have not even started with your workweek to provide financially.

There are no ways around life, it happens! I know you have been strong, brave, and even tough, that is honorable, but think about the morning you were sitting at the foot of your bed overwhelmed to face another day. Remember what that felt like? When you let down your tough exterior with no one looking and allowed your heart to speak its hurt. In that moment, you felt a debilitating hollow loneliness that overwhelmed you, but I need to tell you, you were not alone. There was someone sitting next to you, and he heard the cry of your heart. SAINT LUKE THE HISTORIAN

It is interesting to consider that Luke wrote approximately a quarter of the entire New Testament. He was not one of the twelve Apostles and is the only gentile writer of the New Testament. Luke's gospel and the Book of Acts are really two parts of one continuous history of the life and work of Jesus Christ, from John the Baptist to about 60 AD.

Both books are incredibly historically accurate. Why is that so important? Refer, if you will, to the very first chapter of his gospel. Those first verses reveal Luke's purpose for writing,

(see Luke 1:3-4). He writes so Theophilus would know of the certainty of those things of which he had been instructed. That term "certainty" is key!

If any detail of Luke's writings could be found to be mistaken, false, or inaccurate that would likely increase the cloud of doubt over his entire account! Skeptics actually seem to enjoy doing that very thing — finding what they consider to be an error even in some small detail of the Bible and using that to attempt to cast doubt on the truthfulness of all of scripture.

Allow me to tell you about Sir

William Ramsay. He lived 1851-1939. He was a historian and archeologist. He was educated in liberal schools of the latter 1800's that taught the New Testament was not a reliable historical document. They doubted, in particular, the Book of Acts. So, Ramsay had the mindset to doubt the veracity of the scriptures.

He did research in the lands mentioned in the Bible and his mind was changed. Sir Ramsay writes: "I began with a mind unfavorable to (the Book of Acts)." Remember, he had been previously convinced that the New Testament was not historically accurate. He continues: "It was gradually borne in upon me that in various details the narrative showed marvelous truth."

As an historian himself he applied his skills of careful investigation, honestly, and with an open mind. As a result, he refers to Luke as one of the most, if not the most, trustworthy historian of the ancient world. Again, this is important because historical accuracy and spiritual truth are closely related. How so? Because if anyone could prove error in the one (such as the historical aspect), one could go on to challenge the truthfulness

of the other (spiritual aspect).

We believe that God is the author of the Holy Bible. "... holy men of God spake as they were moved by the Holy Ghost." (2 Peter 1:21). "All scripture is given by inspiration of God..." (2 Timothy 3:16). Since the infallible God wrote this book any information given on any subject this book would touch upon would be without error. If any verifiable error could be found in scripture, that would imply that God Himself is prone to error.

However, the truthfulness of God's Word has been remarkably proven over and over. We can be assured that we have not followed cunningly devised fables as Peter writes (2 Peter 1:16). We can trust the truthfulness of scripture.

Of course, assenting to the historical reliability of scripture alone is not enough to become a child of God. By faith we put our trust in what God has accomplished through the life, death, and resurrection of His Son Jesus Christ. And since the Word has been proven to be authoritative in other matters, we must also seek to obey the precepts found therein.

THE JUST PATH

"But the path of the just is as the shining light, that shineth more and more unto the perfect day." Proverbs 4:18

"...The just shall live by faith." Romans 1:17

The Oregon Trail stretches from Missouri to the Pacific Ocean. At first in the 1830's, it was just a cow path travelled by a few hunters and trappers. Soon others followed: on horseback and eventually wagon trains, whole families searching for a new life in what they envisioned as the Promised Land.

If a person wanted to go west, all he needed to do was walk toward the setting sun or use a compass. But if that were all he used, he would have run into high mountains, deep rivers, hostile natives, and wild animals. The Oregon Trail was available so that thousands of people, heading west, could avoid those things.

The Psalmist, in 27:11, tells us, "Teach me thy way, O Lord, and lead me in a plain path, because of mine enemies." The word "plain" here means clear, distinct, pure, simple, unadorned, honest, or common. There should be no mistake on this path. There can be no doubt

which way it goes. God's way is plain.

Psalm 119:105 says, "Thy word is a lamp unto my feet, and a light unto my path." That shining light is the Word of God. The incarnate Christ said, "I am the light of the world." (John 8:12) Our pathway, the path of the just, is lit by Jesus Christ, and if people see us walking that path, they see Jesus.

O how sweet to walk in this pilgrim way; O how bright the path grows from day to day; Leaning on the everlasting arms.

January 2022 Study Questions

January 2 - Ruth 1:1-22

Where is Moab in relation to Bethlehem?

What is an Ephrathite of Bethlehem?

What would it be like to be foreigners in Moab?

What cultural and spiritual issues might Naomi's family dealt with?

What may have caused Mahlon and Chilion to die at such a youthful age?

What reasons can you think of that explains Ruth's attachment to her mother-in-law?

Do you ever blame God for the circumstances in your life?

Commentary: Ruth has the book named after her because she is the star. Her profession of enduring love for Naomi has been incorporated into the wedding vows made by many a couple. But some of us, perhaps even many of us, are more like Naomi. We have followed others dutifully even when we were not sure they were pursuing a faithful direction. We depended on their strengths while uncertain of our own. Then they were gone. Death, divorce, or emotional distance has left us feeling lost and abandoned. Children die too soon or disappear from our lives as they pursue their own futures. We are left with strangers who are closest to us. We reside in a strange land that can never be home. We conclude that

we are at fault and God is punishing us for all our poor choices in life. The eyes of faith become clouded with cataracts that blur and distort our vision of a merciful God. While the Ruth's in our life may be few and far between, there is One who is more faithful than Ruth and bids us rest our weary souls in His care. We seem stuck in our past. But Jesus sees the future that confirms the promise, "And we know that all things work together for good to them that love God, to them who are the called according to his purpose." (Romans 8:28)

January 9 - Ruth 2:1-23

Did Ruth determine ahead of time to work in Boaz's field or was it a coincidence?

Why did Ruth go up to the house to rest?

What change took place that allowed her to drink where the young men drank?

Who is Boaz's mother?

What commonality exists between Boaz's mother and Ruth?

How might this influence Boaz's attitude and actions toward Ruth?

How does Boaz's behavior impact Naomi?

Commentary: The book of Ruth is often thought of in the context of a love story. But it is a love story defined by a character trait often in short supply: integrity. It is an integrity that can leave certain things of real value behind for an uncertain future. Ruth could not forsake her widowed mother-in-law, leaving Naomi to fend for herself. Such a choice would result in great regret. Whatever Naomi's shortcomings she had taken both Ruth and Orpha into her home and into her heart. Despite tragedy her heart revealed a living God stronger than the losses of a husband and two sons. When integrity guides our choices, we often discover that doors begin to open because of what others have heard about us. Boaz had not yet met Ruth but already knows much about her. His integrity in turn resulted in care for her safety, a shared meal with Boaz and the reapers, easier access to water supplies, and increased bounty as Ruth labored in her

gleaning. All this although she was a foreigner. Generosity is one of the fruits that grows from a heart nurtured by integrity. It both gives and receives with equal pleasure. Before the doors of romance ever opened between Ruth and Boaz, they shared the benefits of living lives of integrity.

January 16 - Ruth 3:1-18

What estimate of time passed from the end of chapter two till the beginning of chapter three?

What is Naomi's prime concern for Ruth?

What is the likely age difference between Ruth and Boaz?

What term of endearment do both Naomi and Boaz use when referring to Ruth?

Why hasn't Boaz courted Ruth since he is obviously fond of her?

How do the sleeping arrangements both protect Ruth's virtue and communicate her hopes?

Commentary: If we read this chapter through the lens of our contemporary value system, we could imagine many possibilities that will only obscure our understanding. Nor is there any biblical text that reveals the basis of the behavior described. So, the only other option for understanding what is descried is the character of those involved. Naomi's purpose in proposing such a plan is her desire for a secure future for her daughter-in-law. Ruth has progressed from an unknown foreigner to being accepted socially, at least within the sphere of Boaz's extensive influence. Her gratefulness toward Boaz bridges the difference in age between them. Boaz's fondness for Ruth is likely shaped in part by his mother's experience, Rahab, in making a home and family within the context of Israel. But in his own mind the difference in age seems like too wide a chasm to cross. What we see playing out on the threshing floor that night was a culturally accepted way that a woman could make known her willingness to be the wife of her intended husband without usurping his authority and leadership. Her virtue remains intact, and his self-esteem remains unthreatened.

January 23 - Ruth 4:1-22

How was land subdivided in ancient Israel?

Why was it important for a close relative to redeem the land?

Why didn't Boaz mention Ruth at the beginning of the meeting with the close relative?

What does the close relative mean when he says that it will ruin his own inheritance?

What physical interaction in our culture has had a similar meaning to taking off a sandal?

Why do the neighboring women refer to Obed as the son of Naomi?

Commentary: We mentioned in the commentary on the first chapter about Ruth's vows to Naomi and how they sometimes are used in wedding ceremonies. How ironic that there is nothing ever mentioned about a wedding in the marriage of Boaz and Ruth. Rather, we are treated to something more akin to a courtroom scene taking place at the city gate with ten elders of the city acting as the judicial witnesses of what transpires. First, Boaz makes sure that the first close relative is not interested in acquiring Ruth as a wife as a condition of buying the property. Then Boaz announces that he will buy the property and purchase Ruth as his wife. This is not the typical romantic ending we are used to. But it is not for lack of love on Boaz's part. It is merely the cultural/judicial means that governed the process for redeeming the land owned by a widow with only a close relative to inherit it. However, it does bear a resemblance to our salvation in Christ. Jesus is our close relative who has purchased our salvation on a blood stained cross. His death pays the debt for our sins. We accept, by faith, the gracious saving of our souls. We are redeemed by the blood of the lamb. This is called Justification. It is given, without merit, to all willing to receive it by faith. As we experience being justified, we are freed to live out our calling as the Bride of Christ and bear fruit for His kingdom.

January 30 – I Samuel 1:1-20

What is an Ephraimite?

Why did Elkanah go to Shiloh to worship instead of Jerusalem?

Why did Elkanah have more than one wife?

How many stories in the Bible revolve around women who are barren?

Have you ever misjudged or been misjudged by someone?

How did Eli change the nature of the conversation with Hannah?

Commentary: Most of us have had some experience of our minds and our emotions being disconnected from each other. We worship God with many high thoughts but our praise and joy in Him is lukewarm. A hymn may draw our spirits heavenward, but we cannot remember a thing that was said from the pulpit. We feel broken and barren of spiritual fruit. But the truth may be that we are experiencing growing pains. The pain masks the spiritual growth that is taking place. Hannah had many deep hurts. She was barren and felt like a failure as a woman. Her rival, her husband's other wife, reveled in reminding and taunting her barrenness. But the pain she felt was creating a willingness in her heart to do the unthinkable: to surrender a son she would bear to the Lord. What is the chief fame of our God that we worship and serve? "For God so loved the world, that he gave his only begotten Son, that whosoever believeth in him should not perish, but have everlasting life." (John 3:16) Out of the brokenness of her heart she touched the heart of God who knew exactly what she felt and the depth of love she gave. OBEDIENCE: THE DECIDING FACTOR

I must confess at times I get a little weary of all the dos and don'ts in life. It seems that everything has a list of what we can do and what we cannot do. It seems at times that the cannot do list is much larger than the can-do list.

No matter what membership you join whether it is a health club, a financial institution, or a church there are rules. Sometimes we get a little legalistic with those rules and yet without rules our entire world would end up in chaos.

Some people are always complaining that the churches are too legalistic. Yet, I never hear them say their doctor is too legalistic. Never once do I hear them complain that the bank, they have their checking account in is too legalistic. Everything in the world is based upon being legalistic. You must obey the rules.

I know we can go overboard with this rule business. A little wisdom should help us in this regard. The key to rules is obedience.

Trust and obey together is the only thing that really pleases God. Regardless of who you are, only one thing gets God's attention. It is the one thing everyone can do, and that is obedience. Regardless of where you have built your theological fences, it is within the scope of every person to obey God otherwise nobody could disobey God. You cannot have one without the other.

Out in the world we expect people to obey us, and every relationship is built upon this as a foundation. We expect people to obey us, but we fail to obey God. Somebody needs to write a new theme song for humanity, "I am God, hear me roar."

After reading the Bible for quite some time, I have really concluded that obedience is the path to receive what God has for me. Studying the characters of the Bible I discover the key to getting where God wants them to be was obedience. Calamity came to them because of disobedience.

This brings me to the idea that God always responds to obedience or disobedience. It is the thing that really gets God's attention. God will honor both obedience and disobedience.

Of course, when we think of obeying God, we think of being richly blessed and honored by God. Time after time in the Scriptures, we read of men and women who obeyed God and were blessed by God because of that. We also read of people who disobeyed God even a whole nation and they incurred the wrath of God.

It is through obedience that we obtain the favor of God. When we do what God asks us to do, it ushers us into the throne room of His favor. God delights in our obedience. God responds most favorably when we set our hearts to obey Him in all things.

Sure, we make mistakes. The reason it is a mistake is that we did not intend to do it that way. God will always forgive us of our sins if we come to Him, confess them, and invite His blessing upon our life.

In the same way, disobedience incurs the anger of God. How many people today are living under God's anger and don't really know it? How many people are struggling in life because they are under the displeasure of God because of some disobedience?

I believe it is one of our duties as Christians to bring to an unsaved world the path to God's pleasure and favor. We call it evangelism because it is bringing the lost people the good news of God's favor and how to get there.

The great delight of the Christian life is living in obedience to the Lord. You see, when a person really is in love with someone, all the rules of marriage are immaterial. None of those rules are forcing me to do anything but is bringing me to the place of obedience is the fact that I love this one I am living with. Marriage is based not upon rules and regulations but upon love. The rules and regulations are for those who refuse to live in love.

I believe the key to divine blessing is simply obedience. It cannot be said any simpler. If I am to receive what God has for me, I need to be on the path of obedience. It is not a matter of interpretation or, as the Scripture says, any private interpretation. Rather, it is a matter of simply obeying what God says.

We can take the Scripture apart piece by piece and parse every word and phrase but if we are not obeying the Word, it does not mean anything at all to us. Not knowing what a word means it does not matter that much but obeying that

word is crucial. Why is it we made sure an interpretation and explanation but fail in simple application?

Obedience is simply a matter of faith. Faith is a matter of hearing God's Word and doing it, and sometimes doing it without knowing all the details.

The question of the unbeliever is always why. When Saul of Tarsus met Christ on the road to Damascus, he did not ask why, but said rather "what

wouldst thou have me to do?"

Behind every blessing from God is a simple act of obedience. God has always expressed His pleasure when a man or woman obeyed His Word. My whole life rides upon one thing, and that is obedience. Who am I obeying?

Either I am obeying God or, I am obeying the god of this world.

Do you like to have people speak well of you – to get praise for a work well done – to have honor in the sight of men? I believe most people do; it is only human nature to be that way. If this is what you want, Jesus has shown us how it should be done.

The Pharisees were a class of people who liked the praise of men very much. They would stand on the street corners or in the marketplace and recite long prayers to show how righteous they were. Do you know what Jesus called these people? He called them hypocrites; they were

like whitewashed sepulchers which appeared nice and clean on the outside but inside they were full of all manner of uncleanness. If we would appear good outside, we should get clean inside first. Good thoughts and concern for others can help us to be clean inside.

Jesus gave an illustration about those who were invited to a wedding. The well-to-do Jews had special rooms for special people. These surrounded a courtyard where the wedding took place. They were on a balcony and were open on the side next

to the court. If you were in one of these upper rooms, you had an unobstructed view of the bride and groom, and it was a great honor to be seated there. There were also rooms below, under the upper rooms. They were less desirable, and it was difficult to see the wedding.

Jesus said, "When you are invited to a wedding, don't go to the highest room and take the best seat because it might be that the one who invited you had a more honorable person in mind for that place. He would come to you and say to you, "Give this man your place," and you would begin with shame to take the lowest room. Instead of taking the highest room you should sit in the lowest room and the poorest seat you can find; then, when the one who invited you saw you there, he would say, "Friend, go up higher": then you would have the praise

of men. "Whosoever exalteth himself should be abased; and he that humblest himself shall be exalted."

Jesus taught that to be humble it is necessary for us to learn how to live and respect those around us. We can all understand that even in our work – the jobs we do, it is first necessary to start at the bottom and accept the lowest pay until we learn how to do the work efficiently. It is essential to do this way in our natural occupations and it is even more so in our spiritual lives.

For the Christian, humility is a necessary virtue all the time. To come up higher – to take our place in the upper room – comes only after this life is over – when Jesus calls us home to Heaven.

DUNKARD BRETHREN HISTORY

The Dunkard Brethren Church in June 1926 separated from the larger Church of the Brethren, formerly known as the German Baptist Brethren before 1908. That event did not happen suddenly or without recognition of the seriousness of that event. There had been a series of changes that had affected the Church of the Brethren during the previous decade or more. There had been a shift from the Biblical beliefs and lifestyles by many of the members and especially of those in leadership. Decisions made at several Annual Conferences assumed a need for modernizing the Church and making it more popular particularly with younger believers. Many who were older also desired these changes.

These changes began to draw the attention of various leaders across the Brotherhood. As they exchanged their views and alarms, they wondered what could bring the Church back to its former spiritual beliefs and practices. Among the leaders who were concerned was Matthew Mays Eshelman who then lived in Glendora California, another concerned leader was Benjamin Elias Kesler, then living in Poplar Bluff, Missouri. Eshelman had been known across the Brotherhood since 1870's. He had been active in promoting various Brethren college ventures and had authored at least two books. Kesler had been a long-time missionary supported by the General Mission Board in developing congregations in various communities, particularly in Missouri, Arkansas, and Colorado.

These leaders developed a Statement of Principles that they

wanted to share as the basis for the continued belief and practice of the Church. To do so, they contemplated the establishment of a Church paper. When Eshelman died in 1921, those plans were postponed. Since conditions did not improve within the Church, the remaining leaders decided in 1922 to move ahead with those plans.

The Bible Monitor was established with B. E. Kesler as the Editor with the first issue mailed in October 1922. This year marks one hundred years of the Bible Monitor. After existing as a private stock company established in 1923, the Bible Monitor was gifted to the Dunkard Brethren Church in 1928.

CONNECTIONS

As members of the Bible Study Board our hope in writing monthly articles related to the Adult Sunday School Lessons is that we all see afresh different points of connection that reveal the Word made flesh.

Ruth 4:18-22, "Now these are the generations of Pharez: Pharez begat Hezron, And Hezron began Ram, and Ram begat Amminadab, And Amminadab begat Nahshon, and Nahshon begat Salmon, And Salmon begat Boaz, and Boaz begat Obed, And Obed begat Jesse, and Jesse begat David.

While these verses are not odd in themselves, they are an odd choice to comment upon. My interest in genealogy is confined to living relatives, aunts, uncles, and cousins, my children, grandchildren, and soon to be

two great grandchildren. I am related to first cousins, first cousins twice removed, second cousins once removed, and straight across third cousins. If you do not understand these terms do not take on any tasks where you need to know the answers. Beyond my own immediate family, I am hard pressed to know names or faces or interests in life of those on different branches of my family tree.

We are hard pressed to know much more about some of the names listed above. We have learned a lot about Ruth and some about Boaz. Jesse is mentioned several times as we learn about David. For the most part, the rest of the names are obscure only sharing in the genealogy of David. His life is what adds prominence to the names before him. Since God also promised David that the Messiah would come through his offspring David adds prominence to every name listed after him in Matthew's genealogy till, we come to Jesus, who is the promised Messiah.

However, there is a shift between the Old and New Testament. In the New Testament righteousness no longer is associated with the ancestors of Abraham. There are no ancestral lines mentioned coming from Peter or Paul or any of the other apostles. Our inclusion into the promises of God is based on one name only. It is the name above all other names both in this age and the age to come. It is the name of Jesus. My relationship with Him is not based on who my parents are or any other relative of mine. It is based on my faith in Jesus. Such saving faith is itself a gift of God. (Ephesians 2:8) So I have no ground upon which to boast except in the grace of God through Jesus Christ.

Nonetheless, there is a record of each of our ancestral lines. It is not a biological record but a record of all those who have been born again. There will be only one be-getter in the whole book, one Father of us all. It is the Book of Life and in it is the record of all the children of God from first to last. Perhaps there may be some asterisks beside our names. Those asterisks will be the names of those who were used by God, who helped assist in our new birth. It may be an earthly parent, friend, neighbor, stranger, or evangelist who shined the light of God upon our darkened soul. Regardless of who, it means that we will have many, many brothers and sisters with whom to love and learn for all eternity. It is a family reunion none of us want to miss.
