NAKEDNESS

We are all born naked. It has been said that some were born with a silver spoon in their mouth but even those babies were born naked. In the world today, there seems to be different definitions of what being naked is. Some would say it means not having enough clothes on while others would say it refers to no clothes at all. This might seem like a silly question but what does it mean to be naked? Does it mean that any creature that isn't clothed is naked? No. We don't consider animals to be naked. Even in the case of an animal with some sort of body covering like fur or feathers, if we would de-fur, shave or pluck them, we might consider them bald but not naked. No, nakedness is exclusively a human trait. So what exactly is nakedness?

The first account of nakedness occurred near the beginning of time in the Garden of Eden. God had created Adam and Eve and they were naked. But initially, their nakedness was not shameful. That's an interesting quandary. Only after eating of the fruit of the tree of the knowledge of good and evil was their nakedness shameful. Aha! Now we're getting somewhere. What caused this sudden demotion of nakedness? Afterall, their wardrobe had not changed. While their disobedience had not caused a change in their bodies, it caused a change in their souls.

In response, they sewed together aprons to try and cover themselves. In some

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children's books, you may see this illustrated by Adam wearing something like swimming trunks and Eve wearing something like a bikini. However, I don't believe they were trying to cover what we would consider private parts of their bodies. I believe they correctly understood in what sense they were now naked. What was now laid bare was not their skin (their bodies), for that had previously been exposed and was not shameful. Their bodies had not broken God's law. Rather. their souls contained in their bodies had broken God's law. Because of that, I suspect that the nakedness they were now trying to cover was not their skin but was specifically their flesh (their humanness). Thinking of this. I have to wonder if their aprons looked less like secular swimwear and more like Muslim burkas

After God found them trying to hide in the garden under their figgy aprons, it appears that the aprons they had made to cover their shame were inappropriate. Why were they inappropriate? Hebrews 9:22 would seem to answer this. "And almost all things are by the law purged with blood; and without shedding of

blood is no remission." They had broken God's law and because of that, God apparently sacrificed animals and shed blood to fashion coats of skins as clothes for them to cover their nakedness (shame).

While God provided clothes for Adam and Eve, their clothes did not totally cover their nakedness. Rather, their clothes were a foreshadow of the future, of the only covering that could completely hide their nakedness. That future covering was far greater than their coats of skins. That future covering was the shed blood and sacrificed flesh of the Son of God: Jesus Christ.

Today, things haven't changed much. We inherited our nakedness from father Adam. We can wear clothes from head to toe but still be naked. While our clothing is important and necessary, it is much like those fig leaf aprons in the garden. Our clothing covers our bodies but cannot cover our sinful souls. To avoid nakedness, we must put on the covering that Father God offers us; the shed blood and sacrificed flesh of the Son of God: Jesus Christ.

"For the life of the flesh is in

the blood: and I have given it to you upon the altar to make an atonement for your souls: for it is the blood that maketh an atonement for the soul." Lev. 17:11

"For this is my blood of the new testament, which is shed for many for the remission of sins." Matt. 26:28

"Giving thanks unto the Father, which hath made us meet to be partakers of the inheritance of the saints in light: Who hath delivered us from the power of darkness, and hath translated us into the kingdom of his dear Son: In whom we have

redemption through his blood, even the forgiveness of sins." Col. 1:12-14

THE CHURCH OF TOMORROW, WHEN TOMORROW IS TODAY

Godly Role Models

Over the course of the past year or two, I have provided some

commentary on the state of the church, and our response to politics and world events. Right or wrong, I have been very critical of many decisions and movements we have made as a whole, and through this, one response in particular seems to always come up. What do we do about these issues?

This query is one that I found was never answerable. Partially because I have never been able to find an answer, but more so because to even define it requires going down an abstract rabbit hole too deep to fit into my Instagram messages. I will not claim to have the answers, however I feel that in the course of this paper I will be able to identify major issues and offer broad solutions. Through this exercise I hope to convict those better equipped to implement and effectuate solutions to do so.

This paper will mainly be addressing people of the younger generation, and specifically men due to their roles in leadership. We are oft called the Church of tomorrow, and as frequently pointed out by many of our older brothers, Tomorrow is rapidly becoming Today. This is not to say that the older generations are exempted from this conversation, let alone have no part to play in its discussion and implementation. I am merely advocating that to induct deep and effectual change we must begin with the groups furthest in the future.

The children, teens, and young adults will not only be the ones to start the implementations of changes, but the ones to sow much deeper seeds. We may not be the ones to reap the benefits of change, but certainly our children will be. "These trees which he plants, and under whose shade he shall never sit, he loves them for themselves, and for the sake of his children and his children's children, who are to sit beneath the shadow of their spreading boughs." - Hyacinthe Loyson

It is important to remember that we are one body under Christ, and to exempt anyone from "The Conversation" would be at least partially, cutting them from the flock. I am not suggesting this, merely reminding that if we do not act in the interests of those not even born yet, might we be sowing the seeds of our own destruction? I will be getting into issues directed at my generation later in this paper, but for now I will focus on the broad picture.

One of the biggest issues I have come across during this thought experiment has been one of leadership. And I need to preface this with a disclaimer that I am not pointing a finger at our leadership, nor disparaging them. I believe that we are blessed to have wonderful, God-fearing men leading us and we should be forever grateful for their blessing. However, in our attempts to not be like the world, have we accidentally picked up one destructive trait?

Many young men both outside of the church and within are gravitating towards a certain type of individual. Two examples of these people are Andrew Tate, and Jordan Peterson. While the latter is more nuanced, the former is unfortunately a morally gray, Godless man. Peterson is more complicated as he tends to lean more into the Judeo-Christian system of morals and beliefs, but he is still by no means a Godly man. So why are we as a generation being drawn to these types?

Tate and Peterson teach a sometimes forgotten, but fundamentally simple, message of strong men. Let's start with Tate; He has risen to popularity for advertising riches, women, and responsibility. These fundamental ideals appeal to the instinctive male desire, to lead and to control. Peterson has a similar message, but focused on the good that men can achieve in good stead, of leading society and family in a moral and good direction.

These higher, harder to attain ideals appeal to the deeper and more intellectual male desire to push further and achieve higher goals. Neither group of behaviors and desires are bad at their core. In fact it is quite the opposite. Man was created to be stewards over the earth, and to lead the church and family in a Godoriented way. That is where the issue begins, with the God-oriented direction.

You see, neither of these men are Christians. Tate used to be a Christian by name but recently transitioned to the Islamic faith, citing reasons such as that Muslims defend their faith, and Christians just lay down and take the abuse. In his mind, men should vehemently defend themselves against any slight. Peterson is also not a Christian, but every day seems to grow closer. He claims to not believe in God but lives as if there is one because he is scared there is. Do either of them seem like men that should be leading our young men spiritually?

I've long pondered why we would choose to flock to men of this caliber and moral code, and what I've found is that, to understand why, one must take a step back and define the bigger cultural picture.

The sexual revolution aggressively placed women at the front of the line, while simultaneously pushing men to take a back seat. Seeing this, the church gave a valiant effort against it, but has slowly faltered. Outside of conservative Christianity, women preachers are very common. Women leading churches and communities continue to appear. However, the Bible specifically designates men as the spiritual heads.

"Wives, submit yourselves unto your own husbands, as unto the Lord. For the husband is the head of the wife, even as Christ is the head of the church: and he is the saviour of the body. Therefore as the church is subject unto Christ, so let the wives be to their own husbands in every thing. Husbands, love your wives, even as Christ also loved the church, and gave himself for it; That he might sanctify and cleanse it with the washing of water by the word," Ephesians 5:22–26

All of that said, I am not insinuating that we do not preach these ideals, quite the contrary. Over the past many years, this message has been pushed very heavily. The part that isn't taught is what people like Tate and Peterson teach, that men must be strong and masculine, not afraid to take the responsibility on their

own shoulders. Feminism has shoved in this idea that men must take a backseat, and it seems that it has slowly worked its way through the cracks into our churches. There is an epidemic in our culture of "letting someone else do it." In our minds there is always someone else that will step up and take responsibility, but by the time someone does, it's usually too late.

In my opinion, many of our men are fundamentally weak. This is not a dig at anyone, merely a generalization based upon my observations. We tend to create theologically sound and strong men, but who are soft spoken and who are shy to correct. Dancing around issues and playing politics seems to be a behavior that is increasingly emerging, because we cannot hurt anyone's feelings or make a faltering brother to feel he is doing wrongly. We look down upon abrasiveness and rebuke, fearing it will drive people away and form wedges between people. We prepare ourselves spiritually to serve God, while neglecting our duty to prepare ourselves physically and mentally to face evil head on!

Someone asked me recently; if it came to be that we were thrust into a time of persecution, would our church actually stand up against it? As I thought more about it, I truly am not sure. We talk the talk, but do we walk the walk? Can we truly say with all certainty that we would draw a firm line in the sand, or would we slowly make concessions until we were exactly where Satan wants us to be?

"Preach the word; be instant in season, out of season; reprove, rebuke, exhort with all longsuffering and doctrine." - 2 Timothy 4:2

"All scripture *is* given by inspiration of God, and *is* profitable for doctrine, for reproof, for correction, for instruction in righteousness:" - 2 Timothy 3:16

"As many as I love, I rebuke and chasten: be zealous therefore, and repent." - Revelation 3:19

We are called to be zealous in our pursuit of Christ. To love God is to strive to be like Him! "I rebuke and chasten". We are to call forth sin out of our midst with anger and conviction, not dance around it and rid of it eventually. We expel far too much energy on preserving our relationships with people, and not nearly enough chasing fervently after the Father. There is a solution to this, but we will address that further in the paper. I would like to get the issues fully listed first.

We as a people have gotten very good at staying busy. We are not very good at quietly sitting and observing and listening. In my generation, it was 'Walkmans' and 'Rubik's cubes', this generation is 'air pods' and 'fidget spinners'. We must constantly be entertained. Something in our ears and

something for our fingers to do. We have lost the art of silence and meditation. Being over stimulated and busy is a distraction, and a good one from the devil. You may say," I don't have those issues" but if you are honest, almost everyone does. The items we entertain ourselves with are very seldom evil in and of themselves, and therefore they are easily shrugged off as harmless.

As a people, we have gotten very good at prayer being a one-way conversation talking to God, and that is not all bad, but I believe we most times forget to listen for the answer. We pray and rush back into our schedules and leave it at that. We figure if God wants our attention, He will find a way to get it. We forget that God wants a relationship and He most times talks in the still small voice. 1st Kings 19:11-13 "And he said, Go forth, and stand upon the mount before the LORD. And, behold, the LORD passed by, and a great and strong wind rent the mountains, and brake in pieces the rocks before the LORD: but the LORD was not in the wind and after the wind an earthquake; but the LORD was not in the earthquake: And after the earthquake a fire: but the

HIS WORDS IN MY MOUTH

The only solution to this hatred is not more laws, which only addresses the surface, but dealing with the real problem, which is sin. Nobody wants to talk about sin. We would rather blame our problems and difficulties on something else or someone else. It is easier to deal with the symptoms.

In light of the difficult times in which we live, we have the impression that we need to be better equipped to handle our situation. We believe that education and training, not to mention experience, are necessary to deal with the difficulties at hand. It is interesting to note that when God calls a man for a particular job, the man, on the surface, is really not qualified for the job. Jeremiah was not "equipped" for the job at hand. And he made this fact known to God.

Some people believe that they can handle anything that comes their way. And then, something comes their way that they cannot handle and blows them completely off the road. It is the person that understands what he can't handle that God can use. When Jeremiah received God's call, he countered with "Ah, Lord GOD! Behold, I cannot speak: for I am a child" Jer. 1:6 I don't think Jeremiah is making an excuse here. I believe he was stating the obvious. He did not have the experience and therefore, who in the world would listen to him? Hove God's response to Jeremiah. "But the LORD said unto me, Say not, I am a child: for thou shalt go to all that I shall send thee, and whatsoever I command thee thou shalt speak." Jer. 1:7. From this passage, I get the idea that what God wants Jeremiah to do

does not rest upon Jeremiah's ability or qualifications. If that's the way God ran his business, we'd all be in a lot of trouble. The whole weight of Jeremiah's work was on God. "All that I shall send thee." "Whatsoever I command thee."

When you think about it, it's a very easy job. I don't have to try to figure out how to do something when God is in control of what He wants me to do. When God calls a person to do a particular job, He equips that person particularly for that job. And we may not know that we have been qualified for what God has called us to do.

I think one of the things God is trying to get Jeremiah and us to understand is that we are not called to articulate our opinion but rather to state God's truth. So many people today are trying to articulate their own opinion and many times it veers far off God's intended purpose. We may not originate the message. The message does not originate with the messenger. The messenger delivers a message that was given to him or her.

I believe one thing Jeremiah

learned from his experience was that most of the time, doing God's work is inconvenient. It is hard for us to get a hold of this truth. We believe that we can slip God's work into whatever we're doing at the time. The grave danger is that we tend to modify the word that God is giving us to speak. We try to put it into the culture and make it culturally sensitive so that we don't offend anyone. I think Jeremiah found out very quickly that that is not how God works We too need to understand that that's not how God works. When God calls us. He wants His word and not our interpretation of what God means to guide us.

In our celebrity saturated culture, we believe that in order to get something done, we have to be a celebrity and well-liked by the majority of people. However, as we come to the word God wants us to deliver to this generation, it is not often going to be a word that they will accept and like. If our culture understands what is right and wrong, why do they need a word from God? The problem is, our culture is out of sync with what is truly right and truly

wrong. It seems that our culture concludes that wrong isn't quite as bad as our fathers taught and sin is merely a matter of interpretation. So when the man or woman of God steps forth to speak God's word, there is a sharp difference between God's

word and the values of today's culture. Although it may be difficult, it is absolutely important that God's word be delivered by God's power.

As members of the Bible Study Board our hope in writing monthly articles related to the Adult SS Lessons is that we all see afresh different points of connection that reveal the Word made flesh.

John 8:34-36

Jesus answered them, Verily, verily, I say until you. Whosoever committeth sin is the servant of sin. And the servant abideth not in the house for ever, but the Son abideth forever. If the Son therefore shall make you free, ye shall be free indeed.

Imagine you are at a church on Sunday morning and the guest speaker is Jesus. After the service, He spends time answering questions. If you were to ask a question, He would most likely begin his answer with "Verily, verily," and you would know he was not just giving His opinion. When Jesus says "Verily, verily," as He does in verse 35, we need to listen carefully.

Jesus' words were designed to show the Pharisees the error in their understanding. They were understanding Jesus to mean some sort of actual bondage like physical slavery. In our own words, we might say that Jesus taught them "No, I'm not talking about slavery to a person or master to whom you are sworn to as a servant. I'm talking about slavery to sin."

When God made Adam and Eve, He made them with an ability to make choices. They were responsible for their actions because they had the moral power to choose what they wanted to do. Even after the fall of Adam and Eve, the power of making choices remained intact. We are not robots or puppets.

We have minds that think, wills that make choices, and hearts that have affections. So, we think we are free!

But Jesus says we are not really free. Without His power in us we are like slaves on a galley. We have minds, wills and hearts, but the chains of our slavery limit our choices. By nature, we are slaves to our own wicked desires and our own wicked impulses! Nobody else is forcing us to commit the sins we commit; we sin because we are slaves to sin. You ask what

is sin? Sin is not simply making bad choices or mistakes; sin is having the desire in our hearts to do the will of the enemy of God. Paul asked the Ephesians (Eph 2:1-3): are you "Quickened" or made alive to break the bondage of the slavery of sin? Surely this was the point Jesus was trying to tell the Pharisees. Let us each examine our own desires to see if we are slaves to sin or are free indeed.

June 2023 Bible Study

June 4 - John 8:21-41 - The Truth Shall Make You Free

Everyone is a seeker. However, what we seek can be as different as night and day. Jesus speaks to those that seek him. That sounds good. But Jesus says their seeking of him will only result in them dying in their sins. How is this possible? Their seeking is not for the purpose of gaining spiritual insight. They do not seek first the kingdom of God. They seek to discredit Jesus rather than discover who he really is. They have no interest in a Messiah who does not justify them as the best and truest of God's people. They mock his words. "Maybe he is going to kill himself. We can't follow him then." Or, "Who do you think you are (since we are the most knowledgeable of God's people)?" Back and forth goes the conversation with every assertion that Jesus puts forth swatted aside.

There is no hint of discernment as to who really stands before them. They do not listen to his words to hear any truth that needs to be heard. The warning to us in this passage is that we never become so smug in our faith that it becomes impossible for us to hear the Word of God when applied to our own lives. We are never built up in our faith by trying to tear down the faith of others. We can be honest in our understanding as well as humble in the light of God's eternal nature.

June 11 - John 8:42-59 - Christ's Heavenly Origin

We continue to listen to the debate between the Jews and Jesus in the temple at Jerusalem. It is worth noting that if this were a sporting event, Jesus is definitely the visiting team. This is no longer the voice crying out in the wilderness that drew many to John the Baptist. Jesus is proclaiming his kingdom faith to the seat of Jewish power. This is a clash between two kingdoms. Jesus is not fighting with swords and spears in order to conquer the collective powers of those seated on the Sanhedrin. Jesus is fighting for the heart and soul of Jewish faith. What he sees and they are blind to is the one who really is in control of them. Despite their pristine ancestry it is the devil who is their father. He fills their hearts with murderous intent. He seduces their minds as they fight for the scraps of power and prestige that Rome tosses their way. Jesus can only be perceived as a threat to their own security. Why do they think so? Jesus has no army with which to threaten their position.

Whatever power Jesus may have he has not used to directly threaten their political positions. But if Jesus becomes the hero of the masses, Rome may deem him a threat. Rome's solution to a "Jesus problem" could easily strip away any influence and power they now possess. The inevitable solution to the "Jesus problem" is presented to them by Jesus himself. When Jesus says, "Before Abraham was, I AM." he is declaring that he pre-existed Abraham. He is the God who said to Moses, "I Am who I AM." God has no beginning or end. He has always existed and will always exist. To the ears of the Jews who heard Jesus speak these words, what Jesus said was blasphemy. So they picked up stones in order to

stone him. But Jesus slipped away without being seen. This is but a preview of what is to come.

June 18 - Gen. 45:1-28 - Father's Day

The story of Joseph from beginning to end is one of the most joyous stories in the Bible. Yet, it is a story with much conflict especially between Joseph and his brothers. The conflict can be traced back to their father Jacob. Joseph is a very precocious son and the next to the youngest of 12 sons. But Jacob likes to play favorites with his sons and honors Joseph above them all. The fact that Joseph is the first son of Rachel, Jacob's favorite wife, plays no small part in his favoritism. The text we are reading this Father's Day demonstrates the joyous reconciliation that can still occur in a dysfunctional family when forgiveness has the opportunity to be applied as a healing balm. Joseph is able to see past the wounds inflicted by jealous brothers and recognize the handiwork of God that ultimately saves all of their lives from a lengthy famine. May each one of us be able to see past our own wounds to the healing and reconciling wounds inflicted upon Christ Jesus for our sake and for our salvation.

June 25 - John 9:1-23 - The Blind Man Healed Then Questioned

It is not uncommon for us to question or conjecture about certain circumstances. We think we are wise if we know the answers to things where judgment is on display. We can appear to be an authority on where blame should be placed. "Who sinned; this man or his parents since he has been blind since birth?" Life can often seem like a riddle and the person who can answer the most riddles must indeed be wise. Jesus cuts through our fuzzy thinking by declaring both innocent. The real reason this man was born blind is so that the works of God can be revealed through him.

That thought alone should comfort all of us. We exist for the purpose of revealing the works of God. Our blindness may not have anything to do with our eyesight. But like Jesus' disciples we often don't see the possibilities that God provides for the revealing of His love and mercy.

Now Jesus does an odd thing at least in our experience. He spits on the ground and makes clay to anoint the eyes of our blind man. This was not uncommon because the saliva was thought to be of some medicinal benefit. This sounds a bit like letting a dog lick your wound so that it will heal faster. However, the making of such a medicinal benefit breaks the law of working on the Sabbath. So why did Jesus send a blind man, by himself, to wash in the pool of Siloam? Perhaps it wasn't far away and our blind man may have availed himself of its benefits for cleansing his body on numerous occasions. At least he evidently knew how to get himself there. What a different world awaited him after he washed the clay off his face and eyes.

It is difficult for us to imagine what seeing for the first time must be like. Perhaps seeing some natural wonder, like the Grand Canyon or Yosemite Valley, begins to give us an inkling of what our formerly 'blind man' began to see as he walked back home. Nor does he suspect that the healing of his blindness will become 'ground zero' for the storm of unbelief that will surround him. Things begin innocently enough as neighbors and other acquaintances try to figure out if he is, in fact, the same person who sat and begged at this location. What begins as inquisitiveness quickly turns into suspicion. Suspicion turns to accusation as he is brought before the Pharisees. His parents also are brought to make sure that they have the right person. Fear and inquisition begin to rule this day.


