## LGBTQ+

(Part 1 of 2)

Here we are again, at the beginning of another new year. Our human nature tends to like new things, such as the hope and expectations for a new year. We naturally like new things in God's creation that have intrinsic beauty, such as the dawning of a new day, the crispness and brightness of a new fallen snow, the wonder of the vernal bloom or the joy of beholding a new life coming into the world. Even man-made things hold an allure to their newness. Whether a new book, a new bike a new car or a new house. Who doesn't like new things? Clean and new and they often even have a good smell!

However, not everything new is good. Specifically, the

characteristic of newness does not guarantee goodness. This seems especially true with ideas. For every good idea, there seems to be an equal or greater number of bad ideas. Living in a fallen world, that should come as no surprise.

One such bad idea is condensed within an acronym which is relatively new in the timeline of western civilization. Perhaps you haven't heard of LGBTQ+ before and it is now new to you. Most however, have heard of it in the last decade. This acronym stands for lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, queer, etc. While this acronym is relatively new, it does not represent a new idea. We all know that the idea

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of sin, including the sexual and immoral sins of LGBTQ+ have been around for millennia and perhaps since very near the beginning of time.

In our time, what is new about this is the push to normalize the idea, including the behaviors which accompany it. As is often the case within the social fabric of secular group thinking, adoption of new ideas takes time while they are pushed along a common trajectory. Initially, society is asked to simply tolerate the idea. The next stage is then to accept it as something with value. Then those that don't accept it are shamed as bigots and finally, all opposition is crushed.

In considering these stages, we might be able to identify where we are on the timeline. While it might seem that society is quickly evolving on this topic, the foundations of the movement have been in place longer than one might think. The first use of the word "gay" to refer to homosexuality occurred around 1950. For those old enough to remember, the former meaning of the word "gay" was limited to: joyful, carefree, bright and showy. In

trying to push society to tolerate an obvious sin, what better way than to relabel it as something pleasant? Stage 1 complete. Then in 1970, the first Pride March took place in New York City, Los Angeles and Chicago. Again, with the word "pride", a word that society generally sees as positive was used to mask the evil underpinnings of the movement, that contrarily are rooted in shame.

This is one account of how we arrived at where we are today. However, scripture gives us another account in Romans 1:20-32: *"For the invisible things of him from the creation of the world are clearly seen, being understood by the things that are made, even his eternal power and Godhead; so that they are without excuse: Because that, when they knew God, they glorified him not as God, neither were thankful; but became vain in their imaginations, and their foolish heart was darkened. Professing themselves to be wise, they became fools, and changed the glory of the uncorruptible God into an image made like to corruptible man, and to birds, and fourfooted beasts, and creeping things. Wherefore God also gave them*

*up to uncleanness through the lusts of their own hearts, to dishonour their own bodies between themselves: who changed the truth of God into a lie, and worshipped and served the creature more than the Creator, who is blessed for ever. Amen. For this cause God gave them up unto vile affections: for even their women did change the natural use into that which is against nature: And likewise also the men, leaving the natural use of the woman, burned in their lust one toward another; men with men working that which is unseemly, and receiving in themselves that recompence of their error which was meet. And even as they did not like to retain God in their knowledge, God gave them over to a reprobate mind, to do those things which are not convenient; Being filled with all unrighteousness, fornication, wickedness, covetousness, maliciousness; full of envy, murder, debate, deceit, malignity; whisperers, backbiters, haters of God, despiteful, proud, boasters, inventors of evil things, disobedient to parents, without understanding, covenantbreakers, without natural affection, implacable,*

*unmerciful: who knowing the judgment of God, that they which commit such things are worthy of death, not only do the same, but have pleasure in them that do them.”*

While our culture tolerates “gay” and “pride” and even accepts these as things of value, and may label opposers as bigots, God states what these things truly are: uncleanness, dishonour, vile affections and unrighteousness. Further, that these things are an eventual outcome of a people that knew God but didn’t glorify Him as God, weren’t thankful and became vain in their imaginations and their foolish heart was darkened. Sound familiar? I believe it should as it seems we find ourselves within such a people today.

So what are we to do? What are we to think? Where are we to stand? Simply put, we must choose to stand in the Kingdom of Man or the Kingdom of God. The first is like a house built upon the sand that will be washed away and the latter like a house built upon the rock that will stand when the winds blow. We can choose foolishness or wisdom.

And as with any sin, we are to love the sinner but hate the sin. *“Keep yourselves in the love of God, looking for the mercy of our Lord Jesus Christ unto eternal life. And of some have compassion, making a difference: And others save with*

*fear, pulling them out of the fire; hating even the garment spotted by the flesh.”*

## THE INFORMATION SUPERHIGHWAY

*“All scripture is given by inspiration of God, and is profitable for doctrine, for reproof, for correction, for instruction in righteousness.”* II Tim. 3:16

It has been called the information superhighway. Millions, perhaps billions, use it every day, yet how reliable is it? Most people I have talked to feel that it is infallible. They believe that everything on the internet is true. What do you think? I believe there is only one book on which you can rely one hundred percent and that is the Word of God.

Unfortunately, since the advent of Darwinism and Modernism, most Bible “versions” have been unreliable. The first major translation since the King James Version of 1611 was the English Revised Version of the 1880's. Those who translated the Revised Version were Papists (Roman

Catholics) that believed in the overthrow of the European Royalty and who made use of witchcraft. Most translations since then have used the same Greek translation as the Revised Version.

Aside from the King James, there are very few which use the Greek Textus Receptus. It is unfortunate when you tell people that you believe God's Word is totally reliable, they will ask, “Which one?”. The answer is simple. It is the Bible that will furnish the following outcome: *“That the man of God may be perfect, thoroughly furnished unto all good works.”* II Tim. 3:17 Be honest with yourself when you consider this: do all modern versions direct the reader to a

life of holiness? Do all modern versions lead the reader to the outcome just referenced in II Tim. 3:17?

*Father be glory for ever and ever. Amen.” Phil. 4:20 Do we seek to glorify God in everything we do? God’s Holy Word is reliable. Let us glorify God by seeking out His word.*

We were privileged to attend an awareness/fundraiser event for Ananias House. Their mission statement, *“Ananias House bridges the distance between believers in the West and the growing body of Christ in the Middle East and North Africa (MENA) through prayer, Bible training, and physical and spiritual resources to build up God’s global family in an increasingly hostile world.”*

We heard from boots on the ground, video interviews and pastors from the persecuted church of the Middle East. The stories of God showing up and miracles happening are undeniable. The Islamic world is being turned upside down, they are seeing visions, they are hungry for the word, and they are seeing the church stepping up and helping to fill the needs on every level; praying, pastor lead-

ership training, women's leadership training, marriage training (Islamic background people often don't know how to value and love women), physical resources, spiritual resources.

Some of the takeaways from the speakers: *"Don't just pray, join the fight!"* Be intentional about fasting and praying, get involved in giving, giving of our time and resources. Stop complaining and start fighting. Don't fight your fears but take them to the alter (cross) and kill them there. Make the focus Jesus and His Kingdom.

The pastor couple from the Middle East said that to do this, they had to be willing to put their lives and the lives of their children on the alter and tell God they are all His to be used as He sees fit. They see violence and bloodshed, but also miraculous happenings and safe keeping. They no longer face fear but have a peace that only Jesus can bring. They were seeking the face of God on how to grow their church and be effective in the Kingdom and they clearly heard God say, *"Stop trying to build your kingdom and build Mine. Stop working to build numbers or denominations and build the church."* These people are facing life or death in real time, every day. They are putting their life on the line for the sake of the gospel. Most of us will not have the same opportunity but we are not to stand by and do nothing. The list of takeaways above is a start. Go to the website, look around, pray into the situation and listen for God to tell you how to proceed.

God is shaking the Islamic world and ushering in an unshakeable KINGDOM!! Let's go out and be part of it.

## **BROKEN, BUT NOT FORGOTTEN**

Fanny Crosby was one of the great hymn writers of all time. She wrote approximately 6,000 hymns, although she was completely blind from birth. One day her pastor Dr. A. J. Gordon,

who was very much involved in the ministry of healing and praying for the sick, approached her and said, *"Fanny, would you like me to pray that God restores your sight?"*

Without taking a breath, Fanny said, *"No, pastor, I want the first face that I see to be Jesus."*

It is hard to believe anybody would have that kind of an attitude and yet we find that she did. She did not allow her condition to define who she was. She was able to serve God in spite of the human limitations that others might see in her.

Everyone is broken somewhere in their life. Discovering the real source of that brokenness can only be effectively done by the leading of the Holy Spirit. We need to keep in mind that even though we may be broken in many regards, God has not forgotten us. God can use us not because of who or what we are, rather he uses us because of who He is and our willingness to surrender to His leadership in our life.

I believe an attitude of personal perfection hinders us from living the reality of the Christ life. Too many people

have the idea that God is expecting perfection from their life. Every aspect of their life has to be absolutely perfect in order for God to bless and use them. This really is not the truth at all. Too many focus on the outward appearance, rather than on the inward relationship. Many allow their brokenness to define them.

Being broken is not the end of the world. In fact, everyone in some regard experiences some aspect of brokenness. If I take it from a Christian perspective, brokenness reminds me of how much I need God's grace. If I am perfect, I really do not need God. However, recognizing my own imperfection throws me on the grace of the Lord Jesus Christ. He did not die in vain. He did not die for the perfect, for none are. He died for those who would surrender their lives, whatever that life may be, to Him without any conditions attached to it.

When I acknowledge my brokenness, I then can come to God and restoration can begin. As long as I am focused on what I cannot do, God cannot do what He can do in my life. Some Christians refuse to accept the reality of



imperfection. Somehow, they have the idea that God does not honor them if they have aspects of imperfection in their life. Find someone who is imperfect and I will find you someone who knows the imperfection of his own life to the point where he can experience the perfection of God's grace. When we embrace our brokenness and imperfections, we then open up ourselves to God to begin his work.

People struggle trying to deal with their brokenness, trying to hide it, trying to cover it up, trying to pretend it is not there, when all they need to do is surrender to God, brokenness and all.

One problem we might have in this area is if we look backwards to trace the roots of our brokenness. When we look backwards, we find ourselves stumbling and miss what God is doing right now. My brokenness does not define me, but rather allows me to experience the restoring power of God Almighty and move towards God's future for me.

One thing to keep in mind is that God's restoration is not a simple fix-it-up quick kind of a

thing. Rather, it takes a lifetime for God to work in my life and the restoration that begins today does not end until I come face-to-face with the Lord Jesus Christ.

Today is the day God is restoring me and tomorrow will be a new aspect of that restoration and so forth throughout the rest of my life until I see him face-to-face.

My restoration is not rooted in now, but in eternity. I rejoice in what God is doing in my life now, but that is not the end of the story. I look forward to what God is doing in my life and what God will be doing in my life and each day becomes a joyful expectation of the restoring power of God in my life.

There is that day that we look forward to when the restoration will be completely finished. Right now, my spirit has been redeemed, but my body still struggles with the imperfections of sin. I am going to have this body until the day I die, however, until then I can experience God's grace to overcome those imperfections.

What a day it is going to be when we escape this life and the burdens of this life and come

into the presence of God and  
see him face-to-face and begin  
to rejoice that the restoration  
program in our lives has been

completed to the glory of God.

## Elected of God 1 Thessalonians 1:4,5

## PHIL’S PONDERINGS

As we “study to shew *ourselves* approved unto God...”  
January 2024 Bible Study Commentary

### January 7 - 1 Thess. 1:1-10 – Know Your Election of God

As we begin our study of Thessalonians, we can notice immediately that Paul not only speaks for himself but speaks for his co-workers as well. Sylvanus (Silas) has been a frequent companion since the Jerusalem Council. Timothy is often mentioned as a companion of Paul’s as well as the recipient of two epistles which will

bear his name. The character of these two men is highly regarded by Paul because he frequently depends on them to carry on the work of building up the church through faith in Christ Jesus. Paul is often detained by growing ministries in other regions. He also finds himself at times imprisoned due to conflict with public officials. Others are threatened by the loss of influence as the gospel message reorients the hearts and minds of new believers. By God's design, when Paul is limited, others such as Timothy and Sylvanus, fulfill the same ministry. One of the primary purposes of leadership is to call out, train up, and develop more leadership. In our humanity we are all limited. God always has more for us to do than we can do. We lean on Him recognizing that any success is due to His strength within us. When we lean upon Him together, God stirs up our gifts for the blessing of His church. We all grow as a result.

### **January 14 - 1 Thess. 2:1-12 – Holy, Just, and Unblameable**

(Read Acts 16:6 to Acts 17:15)

The above reference provides context for the conflict Paul refers to in the passage we are studying today. Many of us struggle to share our thoughts when conflict arises. So, whether it is in our family and homes or standing in the town square, we tend to shut down or say things that later leave us feeling ashamed. Fight or flight is a common reaction. But we are amazed when someone can keep their head when all those around them are losing theirs. The apostle Paul was just such a person. I'm sure he must have asked for boldness from God many times.

In spite of the anger that others tried to stir up, Paul continued to appeal to their hearts and minds with the truth of the gospel. Such boldness can become contagious. It is not wrong to assume that both Timothy and Silas were strengthened to share the same message as Paul. Those who had received the gospel message were surely encouraged to speak more boldly about Jesus, the King of their lives. In the midst of our own time, filled with much anger and contradictory views, we need to pray for greater boldness. We have great and good news to share of the only One who can lead us through such perilous times.

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**January 21 - 1 Thess. 2:13-20 – Founded in the Midst of Persecution**

Verse 13 begins with the phrase, *“For this cause (or reason)...”* This is always an invitation to look back at what we have just read so that we do not become confused about what Paul is saying. So what is Paul referring to? Paul’s character is always being scrutinized and called into question. The Jews in Philippi forced Paul to leave there. Next they chase Paul out of Thessalonica and then Berea. As controversial a person as Paul is, who will defend him? Paul says that the Thessalonians are his witnesses and it is two-fold in nature. They have seen how he behaves as a father who cares for his children. He works to provide for himself so that he adds no additional burden upon them.

Secondly, and most importantly, God is his witness as well. The faith that Paul has proclaimed has revealed Christ to their hearts. God’s truth is Paul’s greatest witness. When the truth of God’s word converts our hearts and minds we are able to see the events of our own lives from a renewed perspective. Paul portrays the difficulties they are experiencing with the Jews as of the same nature that the earliest Christians experienced in Jerusalem and Israel. Regardless of the historical age, we too may experience similar hardships in our present age. If and when that occurs, may our spiritual vision reveal how close in time we will be with all Christians who have faced persecution.

**January 28 - 1 Thess. 3:1-13 – Stand Fast in the Lord**

*“These things I have spoken unto you, that in me ye might have peace. In the world ye shall have tribulation: but be of good cheer; I have overcome the world.”* (John 16:33)

Tribulation is a part of life. Most of what we experience as tribulation is common to all. It may come in the form of a plane crash or drowning in a lake. Cancer, heart disease, virus pandemics, or dying in our sleep are all part of the landscape of life. But tribulation, because of our faith in Christ, is often a stranger in our lives. As Conservative Christians we may occasionally experience some stares in our direction or asked

if we have a horse and buggy. But seldom are we tested very deeply except when we may spend some of our life on the mission field. But the tranquility of our daily lives may soon be tested in a way that we have not experienced before with the exception of war.

The political landscape in our country is beginning to speak about things that are bound to be disquieting. Violence is more frequently being suggested as a solution to our political processes. The rule of law and our constitutional premises are seen as archaic and a hindrance to solving real life issues. No matter where we personally draw the lines of political debate, we are not free from the consequences our nation will choose.

The hindrances of Satan that Paul refers to in this chapter were real. Paul had forewarned them of the tribulation that was coming. His concern for these new believers was to make sure that their faith had not been overthrown. This is why Paul sent Timothy to them and why he rejoices in their steadfastness after hearing Timothy's report.

As followers of Christ our faith is in the one, who through weakness, has already overcome all of life's tribulations, political or otherwise. The peace that Jesus gives is the promise that tribulation has already been defeated. It is not the final outcome. For those who have faith in Christ Jesus our peace is the certainty that He has already overcome the world.

### Sunday School Lesson Plan
